Sex Day slated today

Touch football, volleyball and a cookout with plenty of hotdogs and hamburgers will highlight Morehead Residence College's annual fall Sex Day Thursday afternoon.

According to Charlie Swift, social lieutenant governor for the residence college, Sex Day festivities will be from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. for all students in Morehead Residence College and their guests.

Fifty cents will be collected from each person to cover costs for the food.

Swift said he expects about 400 people to join the celebration. The food should be on time this year, not one and a half hours late as it was last spring, he added.

Model audition set next week

Bus system changes made

The student bus service has been extended on a trial basis to provide transportation for those living in the four fraternity houses on the Finley Golf Course road as of Wednesday.

Buses will travel Route 54 to Finley twice during lunch hour on weekdays. The buses are scheduled to leave Woolen Gym at 12:05 and 1:05 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and at 11:05 a.m. and 12:35 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

After turning around in the ZBT parking lot, the buses return to the Bell Tower.

At 5:05 p.m., another bus will leave Woolen Gym and drop off riders at the Pines restaurant.

According to Bailey Cobbs, student transportation commissioner, the move is the result of a favorable response to a survey of the four fraternities conducted

by Pete Hall, assistant to the dean of men.

Cobbs foresees no difficulties in the extension. "I hope it will make it easier for a few more students to get into campus," he said. "Hopefully, there will be a few less cars. Just so it helps even a few people."

Cobbs said the Chapel Hill and Carboro Joint Transportation Committee is having the Kimley Horn Association conduct a feasibility study of a widespread bus service in the area. Cobb expressed hope such a service might be in effect by next fall.

SL anticipates little business

Student Legislature (SL), hampered because three of its four standing committees did not meet Wednesday, will have another light meeting tonight.

The only committee that met Wednesday was Rules Committee, which passed out one bill for consideration.

Committeeman Charles Gilliam said the measure would allow SL to meet at 7 instead of 7:30 p.m. Oct. 9. Consumer advocate Ralph Nader is scheduled to speak at 8 that night in Memorial Hall.

From all around state

100-mile ride draws 90 bikers

Ninety bikers rode 100 miles last weekend to get nowhere fast.

Harry Hollis of Columbia, S.C. was the fastest. He made the trip from the Old Well to a small country store outside of Greensboro and back in five and a half hours, 15 minutes ahead of his nearest competitor.

Figure that out — he averaged about 20 miles an hour. He even beat the registration officials to the halfway point.

The League of American Wheelmen Century Run wasn't really a race, though. Most of the inexperienced riders took it a little easier. But not much easier. Sixty of the bikers who rode out of Chapel Hill at 8 a.m. Sunday were checked in by 4 p.m.

Why would anyone want to ride a bicycle 100 miles?

"It's fun, it's really fun."
"There's always that element of suspense... whether you're going to make it or not."

"It's a fetish, an obsession. Maybe we're crazy."

"Well, at least it doesn't pollute."

Whatever it is that attracts the cyclists, it attracts them from all over. More than one-half of the 90 that registered to ride Sunday were from out of town. People got up before daylight or came the night before to join the Century Run from places like Brevard, Winston-Salem, Charlotte, Greenville, High Point and Burlington.

And it attracts all ages. Muscular young bodies were mixed in with middle-age paunches. The oldest rider was E.R. Mogle, who owns a bike shop in Burlington. He's 59 years old. He and his wife used to tour 150 miles a day on their cycles.

"Now I've slowed down a little," Mogle commented after he finished. "The hills are a little harder." He rode the 100 in a little more than eight hours.

Each rider had his own method of surviving the long ride. Gatorade, mixtures of vinegar and honey, beer, peanuts and chocolate candy were pulled

from knapsacks to sustain the bikers as they rode along.

All of the bikers except one were mounted on precision 10-speed bikes. Mike Conrad was the odd man. He rode the 100 miles on a three-speed. When asked if he felt outclassed he threw back his head and laughed. "Don't let those people lie to you. My old Schwinn Sears special is just as good as any of those contraptions."

It seems he was right too. Conrad finished the ride in seven and a half hours, beating over half of the 10-speeds back to the starting point.

"It had its desperate moments," he reported after checking in, "especially the uphill parts. But it was enjoyable."

The day was not enjoyable for all the riders. Bob Newman lost a couple of teeth before he even got out of town. The injury occurred when another biker tried to pass him and their bikes locked wheels.

In spite of the wreck and other minor inconveniences, Beverly Gray, president of the Chapel Hill Bicycle Club, was pleased with the Century Run. "I think we'll go it again next year, if we can get someone to organize it," she said, after most of the bikers were in.

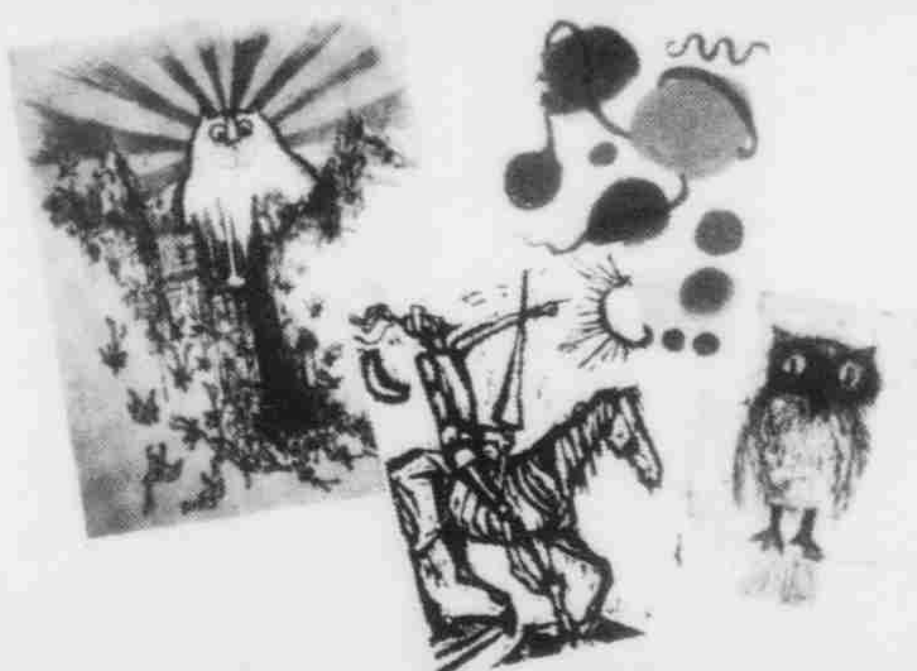

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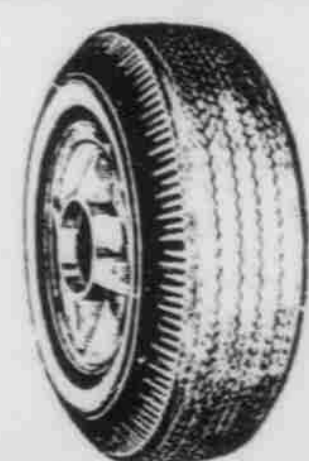
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
