

Veterans to aid draft resisters

The N.C. Veterans for Peace at UNC have begun circulating a petition calling for amnesty for draft resisters, spokesman Gary Martin said Wednesday.

Martin said the veterans expect to get 10,000 signatures from various college campuses across the state.

The petition reads: "We, the undersigned, support a national policy of universal amnesty for all those who, for reasons of conscience, have refused to participate in the

Vietnam war effort. This includes political exiles abroad, Vietnam prisoners at home and any under indictment by the Justice Department."

As the nucleus of the drive, Chapel Hill will be sending representatives to other campuses in the area, Martin said.

He said veterans will be sent to Wake Forest University, Duke University and UNC at Charlotte.

University students will also be on hand to gather signatures at the meeting between President Nixon and evangelist Billy Graham in Charlotte Friday.

The petitions will be taken to

Washington on Dec. 24, which is the 103rd anniversary of Andrew Johnson's post-Civil War amnesty, according to Martin.

Martin encouraged any other campus organization wishing to assist in the circulation of petitions to contact the veterans in Suite C of the Student Union. Office hours are from 10 a.m. to noon and 2 to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The triggering of the petition circulation was in part due to an article on the topic of amnesty which recently appeared in the New Republic.

James Reston Jr., a veteran and instructor in the English department here, authored the article.

Martin said the amnesty petition is not an "easy way out."

Martin referred to the N.C. Veterans for Peace as a "loose-knit organization," which comes together over issues rather than through scheduled meetings. "Anyone interested in participating in the drive for peace should contact us in Suite C or through the main office of the YMCA," said Martin.

UNC student to meet President Nixon today

Pete Tripodi, a UNC political science major, will meet with President Nixon this morning in Washington, he said Wednesday.

In addition to meeting with the President and one of his advisors for senate affairs, Pete Tripodi will meet with Senators Everett Jordan (D-N.C.) and Sam Ervin (D-N.C.); Chief Justice Warren Berger, and Carl Rauh, from the office of the deputy U.S. attorney general.

Tripodi's appointments were confirmed on the basis of research he is doing on bail bonds and on the U.S. Supreme Court.

He received the appointments by writing to Bill Cochran, one of Jordan's aides.

Tripodi will meet with Nixon at 10:30 a.m. for 15 minutes. He said he has been given "unlimited time" during his two-day stay to visit with the other officials.

After returning Friday, Tripodi will meet with Student Body President Joe Stallings to discuss his trip.

Tripodi plans to talk to Rauh Friday on students' rights.

Emphasizing how receptive Jordan's office is to students, Tripodi said the office "went out of its way to schedule the appointments."

Jordan's aide called Tripodi Wednesday afternoon to confirm the meetings, Tripodi said.

Anti-Nixon group meets

A meeting for students interested in going to Charlotte Friday to protest President Richard Nixon's visit to a Billy Graham Crusade will be held at 8 p.m. today in the Student Union, rather than last night as incorrectly reported in Wednesday's DTH.

Nixon will speak at 1:30 p.m. Friday at the Charlotte Coliseum.

Organizers of the protest, which they call "the students to greet Nixon," said groups of people from Charlotte, Greensboro and Fayetteville will also attend the speech.

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UNION TO OFFER ENCOUNTER GROUPS

Beginning the week of October 18, the Carolina Union will offer students an opportunity to participate in a series of encounter groups. The program is designed for persons who feel that they are functioning well in their day-to-day lives and would like to further their personal growth. Supervised by a qualified group facilitator, the sessions involve a group of eight to ten people in ten one-and-one-half hour sessions. The same group of persons meet together for the entire ten sessions over a five week period.

The personal growth encounter groups are a program of interpersonal exercises developed by the Western Behavioral Sciences Institute. Drs. Carl Rogers, William C. Schutz, Irving Janis and Arnold Beisser consulted with the Institute in their development. The program becomes a learning community in which each participant has a chance to know himself and his feelings better and understand how those feelings affect his behavior; learn through honest feedback how his behavior makes other people feel toward him; become more comfortable expressing his own feelings openly and honestly when he wants; and develop a greater ability to listen, to understand, and to be empathic with other people. With an increased awareness of the alternatives available to him, the individual can exercise more choice in what happens between himself and other people.

This semester there will be three groups. They will meet at 1:00 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday; 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday; and 2:00 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays. Students interested in participating may sign up at the Carolina Union Information Desk. There will be a charge of \$5.00 to help offset the costs of the program.

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
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
