

Planetarium displays curios

"Curios of the Cosmos" premiered yesterday at the Morehead Planetarium. The Planetarium show gives viewers an opportunity to put into proper perspective some spectacular "headline markers" of astronomy.

"We project some headlines from the New York Times concerning celestial phenomena, and then attempt to explain astronomy in detail in relation to these headlines to make the subject more relevant to the observer," commented John A. Zunes, Educational Supervisor of the Morehead Planetarium.

The program deals with those astronomical happenings near the earth, like comets, meteors and asteroids, that are read about in magazines and newspapers.

Newly detected classes of celestial objects from deep space are examined in association with almost incomprehensible speeds and distances. Included will be quasars and pulsars.

Black holes, infinite gravitational fields

in space that are strong enough to keep light from going through, are explained to the audience as a part of the deep space phenomena.

"Black holes are of interest because they act like drains, pulling energy and matter into their centers, causing us to receive only a distorted view of the universe," added Zunes.

Visualization of the concepts are enhanced by the use of special projection devices and effects which supplement the man-made universe projected by the

modern Zeiss, Model VI Planetarium Instrument featured in the star theatre.

The show, the second of this season's series at the Planetarium, is narrated by Zunes.

Curtain time is at 1 p.m. each evening through Nov. 29. Matinees will be given at 11 a.m., 1 and 3 p.m. on Saturdays, at 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. on days of home football games, and at 2 and 3 p.m. on Sundays. Special Thanksgiving shows will be presented at 3 and 8 p.m. on Nov. 24, 25 and 26.

An admission fee of \$.75 for children, \$1.00 for students, and \$1.25 for adults is charged at the door. Reservations are not accepted, and all seating is on a first come-first served basis.

"Curios of the Cosmos" will be followed by the highly acclaimed Christmas show, "Star of Wonder," which will run from Nov. 30-Jan. 10. Other shows in the series include "Sky Safari," "The Easter Story," "Stonehenge Et Al," and "The Sagittarius Secret."

Drama tour now organizing

A weekend tour of New York Theatre, including the hit "No, No, Nanette," "Godspell," and Neil Simon's new play "Prisoner of 2nd Avenue," is now being offered by the UNC Bureau of Residential Adult Education.

Dr. Clark Rogers of the drama department will be tour leader for the New York Theatre Tour on Nov. 19-21. The tour costs \$165 and includes

round trip flight to New York, transportation between airport and Taft Hotel, two nights at the hotel in double accommodations, and admission to five plays. Meals are not included. A non-refundable deposit of \$50 is due at registration, and the balance due by Nov. 5.

The group will leave Raleigh-Durham Airport Friday afternoon at 2 p.m., see

the plays, and return to Chapel Hill late Sunday night, about 10:30 p.m. Rogers will lead discussions of the plays during the group sessions in New York.

Friday night the tour group will see "No, No, Nanette," followed by the Saturday matinee of Neil Simon's "Prisoner of 2nd Avenue," directed by Mike Nichols and starring Peter Falk and Lee Grant.

On Saturday evening, the group will see two off-Broadway productions, "The Basic Training of Pavlo Hummel" which centers around a young man in Vietnam, and "The House of Blue Leaves," which won the Drama Critics Award for 1971.

The last play the group will see is the Sunday matinee production of the new sweet rock musical, "Godspell."

Reservations for the three-day trip are now being accepted on a first-come, first-served basis until Friday through the Bureau of Residential Adult Education, 209 Abernathy Hall, or 933-1124.

'New style' guitarist offers demonstration

Robbie Basho plays some of the weirdest music around. In his attempts to re-educate the listening public to think of the steel string guitar as a concert instrument, he mixes Eastern and Occidental styles and incorporates his unique singing style to augment his guitar playing.

Basho will give a free concert demonstration of his "contemporary American" style tonight at 8 p.m. in the Great Hall. The concert is sponsored by the Carolina Union Music Committee.

The artist's style uses American fingerpicking styles, Hindu musical techniques, Western European classicism, and the Japanese and Middle Eastern scales to bring about an appreciation of a semi-classical six and 12-string steel guitar tradition. Although upon first hearing, he seems to have much in common with John Fahey, another new-sounds-for-the-guitar pioneer, closer examination reveals certain differences in their styles.

The artist says that his "new pegasus style" evolved after his religious experience, which was responsible for his denial of the acid rock scene. He says that his discovery of Meher Baba made him "take a look at myself and get cleaned up."

From his days in the underground music cult in which he sported the long hair and beard, he has adopted a new image, as seen on the cover of one of his albums, as he dons Persian dress and mounts a white stallion to emphasize the complex Persian and Hindu rhythms that characterize his new style.

In addition to his five albums on the Tacoma Label he has two albums — "Venus in Cancer," and "Song of the Stallion" — on the Blue Thumb Label. Basho will talk about his style and what makes it unique during his demonstration. In addition, he will be available afterwards to talk to students about the music and its connection with Meher Baba.

'Amanita' tickets now available
