

# UNC booters explosive in 5-3 win over Duke

It was bound to happen eventually. The Carolina soccer squad, after lying dormant for the past three home games, exploded for three second quarter goals within an eight minute span yesterday on Fetzer Field and held on for a rollicking 5-3 victory over arch-rival Duke.

The Tar Heel offense had been almost

totally throttled in three previous losses, but the UNC front line came up with a concentrated onslaught to rob the Blue Devils of a share of the ACC championship.

When Tar Heel forward Dan Ariail scored on a direct kick assist from teammate Kip Ward after luring vaunted Duke goalie Bob James out of the Blue Devil goal, it was the first time in the past

four games that Carolina had taken an early lead.

The Tar Heels then poured in three more goals to build a devastating 4-0 lead that Duke was never able to challenge.

Freshman forward Rick Culberson led a Tar Heel charge that overpowered the Duke fullbacks mid-way through the second period and scored unassisted for UNC's second goal.

Fullback Arden Sterling, who kept Duke at bay with his finest defensive performance of the season, bounced in a corner kick from Culberson just three minutes later.

Just like that, Duke was out of the ballgame and the Tar Heels rose to a third-place tie in the ACC.

Carolina's fourth goal of the afternoon typified the comic aura that surrounded the win.

With the second half barely underway, freshman David Taylor and Culberson mounted a two-man attack on the Blue Devil goal. James came out, the Duke center fullback moved back and the two collided a la Keystone Kops as the ball skipped lazily by. Taylor was given credit for the go.

Duke picked up a goal in the third period and another in the fourth, but the outcome had long been decided.

Taylor muscled past James late in the final quarter to finish up the Carolina scoring act.

Just before Taylor's second goal, senior forward Karl Muster rounded out his varsity career in rousing style, decking a Duke player with a left hook. Muster, who was ejected by the officials, left the field to the cheers of a sizeable Tar Heel following.

The win left Carolina with a 6-4-1 record for the season, while Duke finished up the year at 8-3.

The Blue Devils actually outshot Carolina by a slim 16-15 margin, but the one-sided victory was achieved, according to assistant coach Frank Nelson, "because we played more aggressively and got every break."

Coach Marvin Allen agreed.

"Every player on the team played extremely well," he said following the victory. "Dawson and (Anson) Dorrance looked especially tough and Taylor certainly came up with an outstanding game."

The Tar Heel victory ironically handed the ACC championship to Maryland, which whipped Carolina 3-1 on Monday. Duke finished second in the conference; while UNC's 2-2-1 ACC record gives the Tar Heels a third-place tie with N.C. State.

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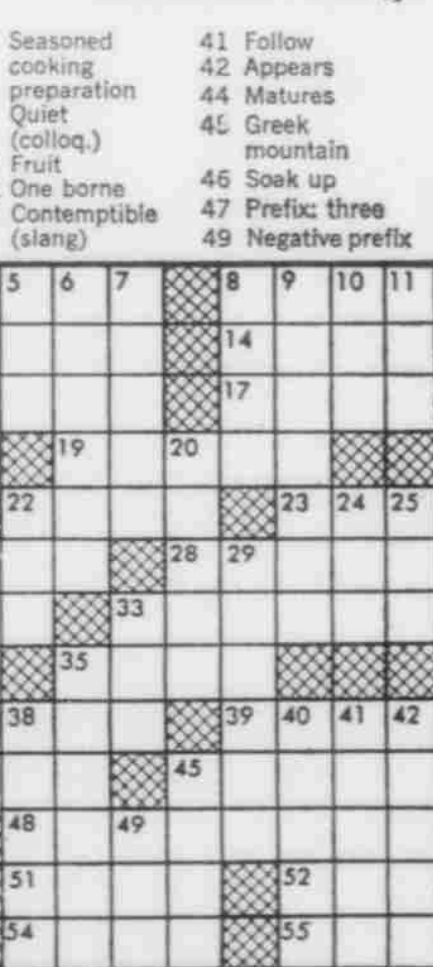

### From UNC offensive line

## 'People expect good effort'

Not enough credit has been given to the Tar Heel offensive line this season, especially since the first four games which saw three Carolina players voted all-ACC offensive linemen of the week by the ACC Football Writer's Association.

"It's as if everyone has just come to expect a good effort from all of us," says Robert "Waldo" Walters.

"Before the start of the season, a lot of people were wondering if we could get the job done like last year's offensive line," Waldo said.

It didn't take long for the offensive line to prove their ability. In the first game against Richmond, Jerry Sain, the Heels' right offensive tackle, was voted the outstanding offensive lineman of the week in the ACC. In the second game against Illinois, Ron Rusnak, the Heels' right offensive guard, was afforded the same award, and in the fourth game against N.C. State, the Heels' offensive tight end, Johnny Cowell, brought the honor home.

Since then, it seems as though the Football Writer's Association has grown complacent of the fine performances turned in week after week by other fine offensive linemen, Waldo Roberts for one.

Waldo is the Heels' left offensive guard, and has proved to be one of the cogs in a very good offensive unit, which has displayed as much, if not more, talent and ability than last year's offensive line.

"We've really had our work cut out for us since Ike has been out with an injury," Waldo says. "Since Ike has been injured,

our opponents' defensive units have concentrated their efforts to our inside running game."

Waldo is referring, of course, to Carolina's speedy tailback, Ike Oglesby, who has been out of action since the first half of the N.C. State game. The Heels have certainly missed his presence as an outside threat.

Until the Clemson game last week when Coach Dooley played Lewis Jolley at the tailback position, the Heels restricted their running attack mainly to the inside. With the exception of the Notre Dame game, the Heel offensive linemen have still moved their defensive opponents all over the field as they opened gaping holes for the running backs.

"Notre Dame has the biggest defensive tackles we've faced all year," Waldo adds, "and they were hard to move. We really missed Ike in that game."

The Heels lost that game 16-0, but still gained more yardage on the ground than the Irish defensive unit had been allowing on the average per game.

Waldo stands 6-2, and tips the scales at 216 pounds, which is small for his position. Waldo replies, "I don't worry about my size. I depend on speed and quickness." He runs a 4.7 seconds 40 yard dash, which is fast for anybody.

"In fact," says Waldo, "I was so small in high school, I was afraid Carolina wouldn't give me an athletic scholarship. I only weighed 170 in my junior year, but I did get up to 190 in my senior year."

The Carolina coaching staff had ample reason to pay attention to Waldo in his prep career, though, as he was voted all-Conference offensive guard in both his

junior and senior years in high school.

Waldo attended Concord High School in Concord, N.C. where he helped lead his team to a 16-3-1 record his last two years. The coaches are very familiar with Concord High School. They also named two of Waldo's high school teammates, Ken Taylor and Bill Hollingsworth. Ken plays behind Johnny Cowell at tight end, and Bill, a defensive end, has been hampered by an injury this season.

Waldo was a defensive end along with Bill Chapman on the freshman team, but was redshirted last year. Waldo says, "I'm glad it's worked out this way, because this year I'm starting."

After a fine team effort in the Clemson game last week, the Heels held down undisputed first place in the ACC. When asked about today's game with Virginia at Charlottesville, Waldo replied, "We definitely have a better team than Virginia, but we're not taking them lightly. We're not going to make the mistake of looking past them to the Duke game."

The Heels can assure themselves at least a tie for the conference championship with a win over Virginia, and can wrap it up with a victory over Duke next week in Durham.

Waldo states that the Cavalier defense stands a lot which makes it hard for the offensive linemen to execute blocks, especially on running plays, but the freshman squad has played defense against our offense this week, and employed the same defensive strategy as Virginia does, so we should be ready. We're really looking forward to the conference title, and a possible Bowl bid."

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## New speech team

UNC's newly-formed individual events speech team will compete in early January at Ohio University.

The team is sponsored by the speech department and coached by Miss Harriet Cherberg, a graduate assistant in speech. According to Miss Cherberg, individual events consist of original oratory, after-dinner speaking, extemporaneous speaking, impromptu speaking and oral interpretation.

The team will compete on the

collegiate level in the same style as debaters. The team will participate in various events on the individual events circuit.

Miss Cherberg is optimistic about the eight-member team. A participant in the individual events circuits herself, she said there is "national material" on her team.
