Deanna Myers, superintendant of family and child services for Orange County, hopes the program will be an annual one that may be added to the Community Chest and the United Fund organizations that are entitled to funds. One of the main problems now






Counseling Service consists of 38 counselors, half male, half female, it also has recourse to the services of seven physicians, one of which is a gynecologist and one a psychologist.
