

Sex on display

Union display interesting, informative

Are you tired of sex? That is, are you tired of all the sex information that has been crammed down your throat since you got to Carolina? Well, just once more, take a little time out to review your knowledge on the subject by going to see the sex exhibit in the South Gallery of the Carolina Union.

If you have remained naive and ignorant on the subject despite your stay

at Carolina, the display can teach you all about venereal disease, birth control devices and family planning.

Most of the information is conveyed through posters, drawings, collages and poems rather than through long, wordy explanations.

The display was borrowed from the University of Georgia Health Services, with additions by the Fall '72 Health Education 33 class. The exhibit is co-sponsored by the Human Sexuality Committee and the Health Ed. 33 class.

Another poem gives some interesting observations about Columbus' voyages to America.

"Jack and Lil went up the hill,
To pick some pretty poses
Jack came down and now he's found
Lil gave him more than roses."

One of the most interesting parts of the exhibit is a display of birth control devices put together by the Health Ed. class. The display includes everything from condoms in four different colors (red, pink, green and basic black) to The Pill (in various types of cases), as well as jellies, foams, suppositories, intra-uterine devices and diaphragms. In fact, it includes just about all methods of control except the rhythm method and abstinence.

The exhibit will remain in the South Gallery until Sunday, and its sponsors strongly recommend it—even if you think you know everything you always wanted to know about sex.

SL's final bow billed for tonight

Champagne, 15 bills and a considerable amount of inverse nostalgia await eager legislators at the last meeting of the Student Legislature (SL) tonight. The new Campus Governing Council (CGC) will take office this Monday.

Bubbly and black ties seem to be the order of the meeting, according to several members. Until this year, which has seen some of SL's rowdiest meetings, many members wore coats and ties to the meetings.

At the meeting, the Rules Committee will put into consideration a bill to allow the members of the new CGC with the most legislative seniority to call the CGC to order if there is no student body president by that time.

Ways and Means Committee, in a last minute meeting Tuesday, approved for consideration an unprecedented 11 bills.

Among those to be brought to the floor tonight are:

> A bill requiring the 21-man CGC to

hold its meetings in the Student Union building;

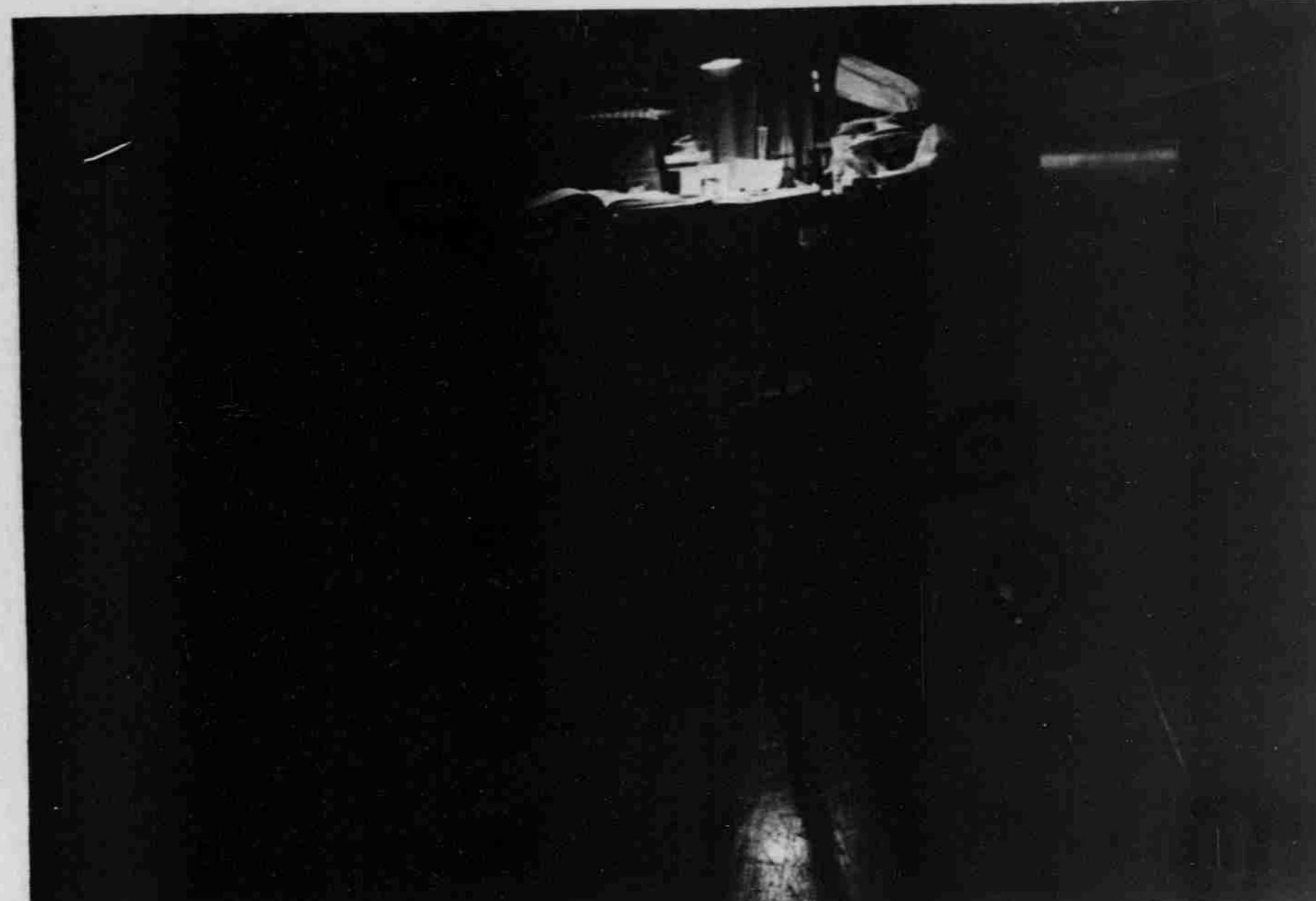
> A bill requiring that the Black Student Movement consider all campus appointees whose offices could have an effect on minorities;

> A resolution urging the Board of Trustees to allocate five cents per student, for a total of \$5,000, to the club sports program;

> A resolution urging members of the U.S. Congress from this district to vote for amnesty for draft resisters.

The Ways and Means Committee will also present a resolution recommending that student body vice president Fred Davenport be appointed as an ACC basketball referee, because of the virtuosity of his rulings from the chair.

A request by the Publications Board for \$2,500 to buy a truck will also be considered during the meeting. The request was approved by the Finance Committee.

AWS endorses transit proposal

The Association of Women Students (AWS) Tuesday night endorsed the proposed Chapel Hill-Carrboro bus system, citing its usefulness to all students, especially women.

According to Amelia Bellows, newly-elected chairperson of AWS, the bus system would increase mobility for women and cut down on the number of women hitchhikers. It would also improve the general transportation

problem of the town, Bellows said. Bellows said that a committee will be formed to investigate purported discrepancies in the UNC athletic system.

Meningitis case

Patricia Gail Gorman, the 19-year-old sophomore who was found to have bacterial meningitis last week, remains in

critical condition in the intensive care unit of Memorial Hospital. Her case remains the only one reported on campus.

Dr. James McCutchan of the Student Health Services said that the Infirmary had checked many people concerned that they might have meningitis. "But their symptoms were from reading the Tar Heel rather than manifestations of the disease," he added.

Sam Shepherd, assistant director of Memorial Hospital, said that all of Gorman's contacts had been checked for meningitis, including friends from Charlotte.

Personnel in the intensive care unit also were checked.

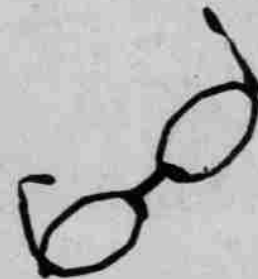

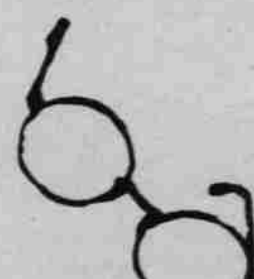
