candidates for UNC student offices - two' for student body president, one for DTH editor - as well as endorsing a second candidate for editor.

Woodring was announced as the party's "favorite son" candidate for student body president. Williams confirmed rumors he will run for both student body president and DTH editor. And Tom Wright, already an announced candidate for DTH editor, was endorsed as a Blue Sky candidate.

Woodring, a sophomore, centered his proposals on corruption in office.

"I plan to set up a public slush fund and make my corruption well known," he said. He promised, if elected, to knock down the walls of student government offices and

turn the area into a swimming pool. Williams, who indicated he went along with the party's platform, said, "I'm running for everything.

In a telephone interview the next day, however, Williams said that he was at the meeting primarily to "entertain the crowd," and said his campaign would continue only on a write-in basis.
