"Forbidden Games"-A French film by Rene Clement, depicting children at play against a background of a nation at war. (Today at 8 p.m., the Great Hall, free flick, French cinema series.)

"Cover Girl"-Gene Kelly dances with Rita Hayworth early in their respective careers; it contains her best dancing (and she was guite good) and his favorite number-in which he dances not with Hayworth but with himself. (Thursday at 7 and 9:30 p.m., Greenlaw Auditorium, \$1.25, the Alternative Cinema **Musical Series.)**

"Walking Tall"-Based on the real life tragedy and punishment visited upon a progressive Tennessee county sheriff. Sheriff Buford Pusser challenges an organized crime network, linked to the state capital, which threatens to take over the country. (Campus Program Council, at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in Hamilton Hall. "Swiss Family Robinson"-The Disney adventure that employs every child's dream:

being shipwrecked on a desert island, living in trees and, most of all, having loads of fun. Ten or twelve years old, it starred James MacArthur in his prime as a cleancut juvenile matinee Idol. (Plaza 1, at 2, 4:25, 6:50 and 9:15 p.m., \$2.25.)

"Foreplay"-A piece of trash in which Zero Mostel and Estelle Parsons squandered their talents. Three smutty and desperately unfunny skits are punctuated by an even less funny obscenity lecture by Professor Irwin Corey. This movie makes "Freeble and the Bean" look like "Bonnie and Ciyde." (Plaza 1, at 3:05, 5:05, 7:05 and 9 p.m., \$2.25.)

"W.W. and the Dixle Dancekings"-When Burt Reynolds isn't clowning around with the mood and turning simple country humor into citified wit, this John Avildsen film is fun and fairly interesting. (Plaza 3 at 3:10, 5:10, 7:10 and 9:10 p.m., \$2.25.)

"King of Hearts"-This is not the greatest film ever made-not even the greatest antiwar film-but it is a whimsical fantasy of reality versus fantasy and whether 'tis better to be classified by society as "sane" or "Insane." Alan Bates plays a World War I soldier who finds out. (Carolina, at 2:20, 4, 5:40, 7:15 and 9:15, \$2.25.)

"Andy Warhol's Dracula"-Not in 3-D like its sister production, "Frankenstein," but some of the same outrageous and goreobsessed people are involved: director Paul Morrissey ("Heat," "Trash") and German



actor Udo Kier, who cuts a slick figure as the Vampire. (Varsity, at 12:45, 2:50, 4:55, 7 and 9:05, \$3.)




Judy Rawlin and Nancy Meador are the lost boys in the story narrated by Pat Freeman and Emmy Reeves and directed by Pat Wilson.











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
