McCarthy takes first in Hearst competition

UNC student Kevin Peter McCarthy has recently been awarded first place nationally in the January General News Writing Competition sponsored by the William Randolph Hearst Foundation.

McCarthy, a senior journalism major from Lancaster, Pa., was awarded the \$900 first prize for his full-page interview article entitled "Back Home with Senator Sam" in the Jan. 30 edition of the Daily Tar Heel.

McCarthy's first place score has qualified him for the National Writing Championship to be held in San Francisco May 11, 12, and 13. First place in that competition carries a \$1500 award.

Currently a staff writer for the DTH, McCarthy has previously served as DTH managing editor and features editor. He has also worked for two summers as an intern for the Lancaster Sunday News, and will work this summer for the Philadelphia Bulletin.

"I resigned as managing editor of the Tar Heel in December because I wanted to get back to writing and reporting," said McCarthy of his prize, "I guess you could say it paid off."


