The 4-2 vote (with Alderman Tommy Gardner also dissenting) came only after Mayor Howard Lee said "we should put the charter on the shelf and forget it" if the board could not work harmoniously to the General Assembly, despite on the revisions.

Alderman Gerry Cohen reacted indignantly to Welsh's charges, saying. "I would reject the notion that any of this stuff was put in as trickery. And I think Mrs. Welsh was wrong to suggest this."

The board decided Feb. 18 in a special meeting with the Charter Commission to submit the entire package of revisions to the legislature for approval. Welsh said she feared the legislature would not bother to examine the revisions carefully.

"I'll lay my cards on the table and say that I really feel if the board is going to approve the changes as they are, I would ask for a cover letter. It is my honest opinion that the legislators won't read this and will not treat it with full knowledge," Welsh said.

The board rejected this proposal.

"All I really want to do is condense the major revisions in the cover letter so. that the legislators can see them clearer," Weish explained after the

The three major revisions in the

charter to be sent to the Legislature include expanding the board from six members to eight, lengthening the mayor's term from two to four years and limiting the mayor to two consecutive

Warnock endorses Campbell for editor

Elliott Warnock, third-place finisher in last week's election for Daily Tar Heel editor, has endorsed Cole C. Campbell in the runoff election.

Campbell finished second in the general election, 191 votes ahead of Warnock, and will face co-candidates Don Baer and Harriet Sugar in the runoff, tentatively scheduled for March 19.

"I've spoken with the candidates at great length," Warnock said in an interview earlier this week.


"Cole Campbell, in my opinion, has all the


