#### University Will Provide Summer Storage Space

The Department of University Housing will again offer free storage facilities for the summer in each of its campus buildings.

Locksmiths are presently installing better locks and improving security facilities to prevent theft of stored items, housing director James Condie said Monday.

To get the free service, students must sign a contract which stipulates that the University and its agents will not be responsible for loss or damage under any conditions.

Students must withdraw their property by the first day of classes, or they will be subject to a \$3 per month service charge. They may only store personal items, and will be responsible for moving items in and out of the storage areas.


### Socialists to Discuss Forming Local Chapter of DSOC
