Joan Templeton, a junior chemistry major from Charlotte, and Linda Love, a junior journalism major from Monroe, announced their candidacies for senior class president and vice-president Friday.

The women called for unification of the senior class through changes in graduation ceremonies and a possible class project organized according to suggestions from members of the class.

"Most seniors don't go to graduation and don't care," Templeton said. "We feel like we represent enough organizations on campus to find out what seniors want out of graduation."
