Massage an enriching experience; it won't rub you the wrong way

The word "massage" conjures up images of sleazy operations near the highway with cheap neon signs welcoming truckers, rooms in the back of pornography shops advertising energetic all-girl staffs and newspaper stories of undercover vice squad officers busting prostitution rings.

There is, however, another world of massage, one that represents a unique and enriching form of human communication. This world is explored and explained in the free film, *Massage*, by author, film-maker and masseur Gordon Inkeles. Sponsored by the Human Sexuality Information and Counseling Service and the Carolina Union, the film will be shown at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 7 in 106 Carroll Hall, as part of a series exploring sexuality and values.

"There are only two situations where most adults will allow other adults to touch them," Inkeles says, "during sex or by individuals who are licensed to touch, such as doctors, tailors or hairdressers. These people are very careful to maintain their distance and to be as impersonal as possible lest the touch be interpreted as a sexual advance."

Carolina Athletic Association president:
Dan Heneghan

Dan Heneghan, a junior history major from Washington, D.C., announced his candidacy for Carolina Athletic Association president Monday.

Heneghan is a member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity, a resident adviser and a UNC Football Club officer. He also participates in club sports.

Heneghan said his major goal as CAA president would be to make students more aware of what CAA is and does.

"I want to bridge the gap between the athletic department and the students, and provide representation of student interests," he said.

Heneghan said he hopes to increase the amount of student input by informing students about CAA through freshman orientation next year.

Heneghan said he also wants to run homecoming more efficiently. He blamed homecoming problems in the past on a lack of guidelines.

"The money from Homecoming Court entrance fees can be used for student awards, or some type of activity to bring the money back to the students," he said.

Heneghan also said the voting procedure for homecoming queen should be updated to ensure a fair and accurate vote. He suggested the addition of a box marked "HC" on student athletic passes to be punched when voting in the homecoming election.

Heneghan said he would write other colleges and survey students for alternatives to present ticket distribution systems at UNC. He suggested testing different distribution methods on the less important games.
