"They see a fraternity partying during the school-week and they generalize that all fraternities ever do is party constantly." Terrell said the IFC will work to dispel stereotypes it sees as misconceptions.



Senate hopefuls to appear on UNC broadcast tonight

The eight Democratic candidates for the U.S. Senate will appear in a statewide televised forum at 10 tonight on the UNC Television Network Viewers in Chapel Hill can see the broadcast on WUNC-TV channel 4.

The one-hour program, Election Special: U.S. Senate Primary, is sponsored by the League of Women Voters. The candidates, all hoping for the chance to unseat Republican U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms in November, will be questioned by Ned Cline of The Charlotte Observer, Brenda Sommers of WPTF radio in Raleigh and Ted Harrison of WFMY-TV in Greensboro.

This is the first broadcast in which all eight candidates have appeared together. The first televised forum was March 17, but only six candidates participated.

The educational television network is also providing 30 minutes of free on-the-air time for each candidate, beginning at 7 p.m. today with state Sen. McNeill Smith. Former newspaper writer Joe Felmet will be on the air at 7 p.m. Wednesday, while state Sen. Lawrence Davis will speak to viewers at the same hour on Thursday.






