Senate hopefuls to appear on UNC broadcast tonight

The eight Democratic candidates for the U.S. Senate will appear in a statewide televised forum at 10 tonight on the UNC Television Network. Viewers in Chapel Hill can see the broadcast on WUNC-TV channel 4.

The one-hour program, *Election Special: U.S. Senate Primary*, is sponsored by the League of Women Voters. The candidates, all hoping for the chance to unseat Republican U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms in November, will be questioned by Ned Cline of *The Charlotte Observer*, Brenda Sommers of WPTF-TV in Raleigh and Ted Harrison of WFMY-TV in Greensboro.

This is the first broadcast in which all eight candidates have appeared together. The first televised forum was March 17, but only six candidates participated.

The educational television network is also providing 30 minutes of free on-the-air time for each candidate, beginning at 7 p.m. today with state Sen. McNeill Smith. Former newspaper writer Joe Felmet will be on the air at 7 p.m. Wednesday, while state Sen. Lawrence Davis will speak to viewers at the same hour on Thursday.

N.C. Rep. Tom Sawyer will be featured at 7 p.m. Friday.

The nightly series, called *Candidate '78*, began with the candidates for statewide office in the 1972 election. The series provides ample means for candidates to air their views at no cost and as a service to the viewing public, according to Richard Hatch, public affairs director for the network.

Both the nightly forum and McNeill Smith's program will be shown in the TV room on the second floor of the Carolina Union.

"Forums are a great opportunity to compare the candidates head-to-head and toe-to-toe," said Mary Ellis, director of the Smith campaign on the UNC campus. "You can't judge a candidate by 30 seconds on a TV commercial or by ads in a newspaper."

A candidate forum will be held at 5 p.m. Saturday at Ehringhaus Field. All candidates except Luther Hodges and Helms are to attend. Activities will include a pig-pickin' and group games.

Only one student to serve on board of transportation

Marcie Dean, a UNC sophomore, was chosen Wednesday as the only student member of the Chapel Hill Board of Transportation. Other members selected were: Jean Ann Hemmens, Paul Morris, John P. Evans and Cameron P. Hargraves.
 Previously, two of the transportation board seats traditionally were assigned to students. Dean and UNC senior Paul Arne served as the two student board members last term.

Two other UNC students, sophomore Rich Eisenstadt and law student Bruce Tindall, had applied for seats on the board but were not selected.

Dean has been working with the UNC South Campus medical complex parking deck proposal and also has been involved in transportation studies, said Craig Brown, former Student Government Transportation Commission director.

Terrell said IFC will begin plans to bring the fraternities together, possibly with an all-fraternity spring weekend next year.

Terrell also said many UNC students hold a negative stereotype of fraternity men. "They see a couple of guys who dress alike and they generalize that all fraternity men dress alike," he said. "They see a fraternity partying during the school-week and they generalize that all fraternities ever do is party constantly." Terrell said the IFC will work to dispel stereotypes it sees as misconceptions.




