## Sanford and Louisburg vote wet

In a surprise move, voters in Sanford and Louisburg gave the go-ahead Wednesday to mixed-drink sales, with about 30 percent of registered voters in both towns going to the polls.

In Sanford, the vote was 1,426 for and 1,165 against. Louisburg voters passed the mixed-drink measure by an 11-vote margin, with 197 for and 186 against. Supporters of the proposition in Sanford began a campaign Monday, saying they had purposely left it to the last minute.

But in Louisburg, town officials had said there was little discussion about the referendum, and it was not expected to pass.

Sanford is a traditionally dry town, and voters were expected to overwhelmingly defeat the mixed-drink proposal Wednesday.

## Officials seek to block PCB test

WARRENTON (AP) — Warrenton town officials decided in executive session Wednesday to seek a temporary restraining order to block the state's test of PCB pickup equipment, scheduled for Thursday morning.

Town Administrator Walter Lee Thompson said the town's attorney, Charles Johnson, had prepared the legal documents and would have them signed by a judge Wednesday night.

David Kelly, assistant state secretary for public safety, met with local officials Wednesday and said he would relay their concern to Gov. Jim Hunt. Kelly met with Hunt on the issue Wednesday afternoon.

"Gov. Hunt is planning to go through with the test as planned," Hunt press secretary Gary Pearce said.

## Mondale campaigns in twin cities

WINSTON-SALEM — (AP) Vice President Walter Mondale, arriving Wednesday to campaign for Democratic Rep. Stephen Neal, fielded questions on the Mideast at an airport news conference and said it is unrealistic to anticipate any agreement in the Mideast without some dissent.

"What is remarkable is that they (President Carter, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin) reached some agreement," Mondale said of the Camp David summit.

"We're delighted by the progress. This is a historical breakthrough of enormous consequence," Mondale said.

## S. Africa's Vorster resigns post

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) — Prime Minister John Vorster announced Wednesday he is resigning for health reasons after 12 years as South Africa's unchallenged political leader. His departure is likely to trigger a power struggle over who will direct this racially divided nation.

He also announced that South Africa will go ahead with elections this year leading to independence for the disputed territory of South-West Africa, also known as Namibia.

The 63-year-old leader said at a news conference that he could no longer fulfill the "strenuous duties" of office, but he said he would be available for the largely ceremonial job of president.

A caucus of Vorster's National Party, dominated by conservative Afrikaners, is to meet Sept. 28 in Cape Town to pick a new president and prime minister.

The new prime minister likely will face a flurry of international censure for the decision on Namibia.

Among top contenders to replace Vorster are the hard-line defense minister, Pieter W. Botha; the staunchly conservative minister of plural relations, or racial affairs, Connie Mulder; Labor Minister Fanie Botha and Foreign Minister Roelof Botha.

The Bothas are not related. The name is common here among Afrikaners, descendants of the original European settlers.

The potential fight for the top job has led to warnings in the Afrikaans press to keep party unity at a crucial time in South Africa's history.

## Common Cause pushing ERA deadline extension

UNC members of Common Cause, a national public lobbying organization, are pushing for extension of the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.

Common Cause has conducted a letter-writing campaign at UNC, urging students to write to their senators and encourage them to vote to extend the ERA ratification period, said Greg Winchester, Common Cause coordinator at UNC.

"The time aspect of it is why we're plunging into it 'so intensely,'" said assistant-coordinator Polly Smith. If the deadline is not extended, the amendment will die in March, she said.

Approximately 125 students are expected to respond to the letter drive, which concluded this month, Smith said.

The House already has passed the extension, and the Senate is due to vote in it soon, Winchester said.

The extension should be granted, Smith said, because "extension is a matter of detail that is specifically granted to Congress by the Constitution."

But Smith said states that wish to

rescind their approval of ERA if the ratification period is extended should not be allowed to do so. She said this will defeat the purpose of extension.

Common Cause has been involved nationally in the movement for passage of ERA, although the national group has not been involved actively in the lobbying for its extension, Winchester said. If the ratification period is extended, Common Cause will lobby full force for ERA, he said.

So far the lobbying movement for ERA by women has not been as good as it could be, Smith said. "It's been a little too radical," she said.

"Common Cause is against special interests but it lobbies for its causes," said Smith. "Our purpose on campus is political awareness."

In addition to the ERA drive, Common Cause at UNC plans to take public opinion polls preceding the Senatorial elections, to have political speakers come to the campus and to take trips to Raleigh and Washington, D.C.

Common Cause has about 25 UNC members, and membership is open to all who are interested, Smith said. Student rates for national membership are \$7.

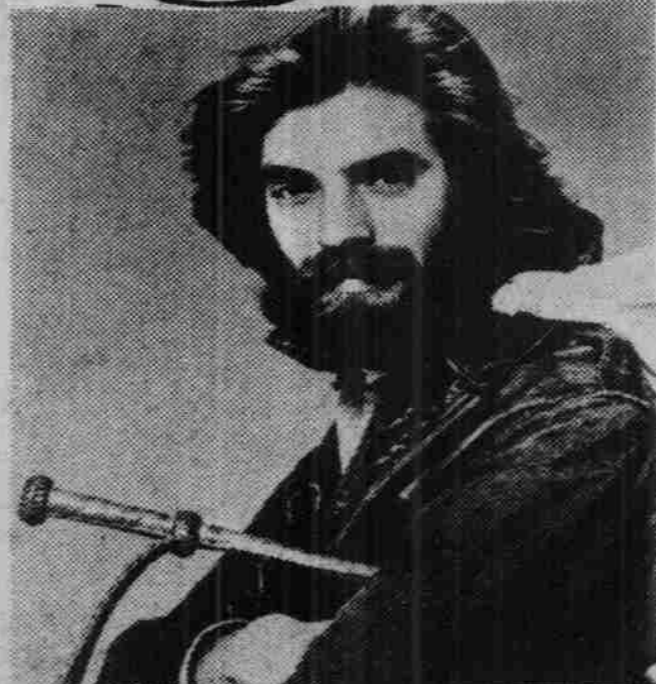

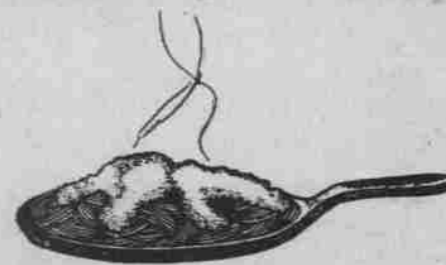
