

Heels beat Tigers, Tech; take hold of first in ACC

Before games last weekend against Clemson and Georgia Tech, the North Carolina baseball team was on the verge of asserting itself as the team to beat in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Now, after the Heels whipped Clemson 14-3 on Saturday and then pummeled Georgia Tech 20-6 on Sunday, the Tar Heels have served notice to the rest of the league that anyone with pretensions about taking the regular season title will have to answer to Carolina first.

The Tar Heels were near awesome at the plate in the two key conference games, scoring 34 runs on 39 hits in pushing their league mark to 8-1.

In other games during the weekend, Carolina lost 10-3 on Thursday to East Carolina, then lost at South Carolina 8-5 in a game played Monday. The Heels are now 26-12 overall.

The win over the Tigers was Carolina's first win at Clemson since Tiger Field opened in 1970.

The Tar Heels took control of the game in the third, scoring seven runs on seven hits and a walk off Clemson starter and loser Mike Brown. The big hit in the inning came from Chris Pittaro when he doubled with the bases loaded to drive in three runs.

Pittaro, Dwight Lowry and Scott Bradley each had three hits to pace the 18-hit Tar Heel attack. Left-hander Shayne Hammond started for the Heels and got the victory, going 5-2/3 innings. He was

relieved in the sixth by James Parks after back-to-back solo home runs by Jimmy Key and Glenn Gallagher.

Sunday, the Heels scored twice in the first and six times in the second to take an 8-1 lead after two innings. The Heels poured it on, scoring nine more runs in the last three innings.

The big guns for Carolina were Lloyd Brewer, Lowry and Bradley. Brewer had three hits, including a home run, and drove in five runs. Lowry had three singles and drove in three runs.

Bradley's three hits, which included a homer, marked the 18th straight game in which the Essex Falls, N. J. sophomore has had at least one hit. That streak breaks the old school record of 17, set last season by Jim Atkinson. Bradley also had four RBIs against the Yellow Jackets.

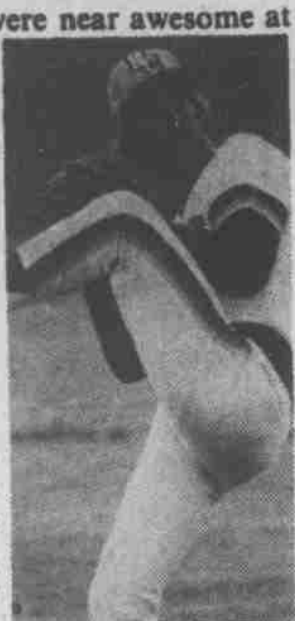
Mark Ochal pitched six innings and picked up his seventh win of the season against the Jackets. Ochal is now 7-2 on the season.

Against the Gamecocks, Bradley and Brewer had homers in the first inning, but the Heels fell short for the second time this year against the Gamecocks.

David Kirk, the second of three Tar Heel pitchers, was saddled with the loss in the game. South Carolina's Bill Landrum ran his record to 7-2 in picking up the win.

The Tar Heels were not alone in playing big conference games. On Saturday, Tech swept a double-header from State while Maryland took two from Duke and Virginia beat Wake Forest. Sunday, State edged Clemson, Virginia beat Duke and Maryland swept two from Wake.

Those results leave Carolina on top of the ACC with an 8-1 league mark. Maryland trails at 6-2, Virginia is 4-2 and Clemson is 2-2. Wake is 3-5, Georgia Tech is 2-4, State is 3-6 and Duke is 0-6.

Maryland 'grounds' Carolina stickmen, 18-12

For 16 years the Maryland lacrosse team has played North Carolina, and for 16 years Carolina has left the field defeated, looking forward to next year and another shot at the Terps.

Meeting No. 17 was supposed to be the lucky one for UNC, because for the first time, they entered the Maryland game as the favorite. But the fifth-ranked Terrapins paid no attention to the rankings and defeated UNC 18-12 Saturday at Fetzter Field.

One of the keys to the Terps' win was their 75-49 superiority in ground balls. Their ball control never allowed the Tar Heels to come closer than within two after the first period.

"We certainly didn't get the ground

balls," UNC coach Willie Scroggs said. "We threw some balls away early, and we got down early and for some reason we couldn't muster it up. If you don't get the ground balls you can't come back."

Tar Heel Doug Hall, whose six goals and three assists kept UNC close, said the team had a letdown. "If you don't get the ground balls, you don't win. We had a good offense and got high percentage shots, but you need the ground balls."

The Terps used their ball control to bombard Carolina goalies Hunter Francis and Tom Sears for 71 shots. Maryland's big gun was Bob Boneillo, who matched Hall's six scores and three assists.

"We've been working on new offenses all week," Boneillo said. "We were saving this offense just for this game. I

was playing well so I took the shots. They entered the game ranked second, but we knew we deserved the No. 2 ranking."

Carolina defensiveman Gary Burns praised the Terp offense. "Boneillo's good. We didn't change anything on defense. Maryland just played a great game."

Sears and Francis combined for 26 saves, but the Terps worked for too many open shots to be stopped. "Their middies were very good," Sears said. "They would move downfield and set up fast and moved the ball around well."

UNC's only lead of the game came at 4:28 of the first period when Hall scored two goals within 30 seconds to give UNC a 2-1 lead.

Boneillo then scored two quick goals

to give the Terps a lead they never lost.

UNC trailed 9-5 at halftime, but Jimmy Wilderson scored twice and Barry Mitchell added a third for the Terps to push the margin to seven.

The two teams traded goals the rest of the half, but Carolina never was closer than six.

Boneillo led the balanced Maryland attack with six, while Wilderson scored four times and Mitchell and Mike Duffy added three scores.

In addition to Hall's six goals, Kevin Griswold scored three and John Schipper, Monty Hill and Mike Burnett added one goal each.

In another upset on Saturday, Virginia, earlier loser to UNC, shocked top-ranked Johns Hopkins 12-9.

Women tracksters first in five events

Tar Heel Rosie Riddick won the discus and the shot put events Saturday to lead the women's track team to an impressive performance at the State Record Relays in Columbia, S.C.

Gary Hofstetter was the only man to win an event for Carolina, as he set a meet record in the 5,000 meters for the second time this season.

His time of 14:02.8 eclipsed the old meet record. Earlier this season he set a

mark in the Richmond Relays.

No team scores were kept.

Nationally ranked Clemson shut out North Carolina 9-0 on Saturday in men's tennis, making it the first time in Atlantic Coast Conference history the Tar Heels had been whitewashed.

It was the first shutout in any match since Trinity defeated UNC in 1972.

Clemson did not lose a set the entire afternoon. UNC's Ken Ludwig came closest to winning a set, as he lost a tiebreaker in the first set before losing 7-6, 6-2 in No. 6 singles.

Defending conference champion Mike Gondolfo defeated Gary Taxman at No. 1 singles, 6-2, 6-4.

In Charlottesville, Va., Monday night, the Tar Heels took on Virginia. Before that match, Carolina had an 18-4 overall record, 2-3 in the ACC.

The Tar Heels have matches remaining with Wake Forest, East Carolina and Duke before beginning play in the ACC Tournament April 18-20 in Winston-Salem.

The North Carolina women's tennis team returns to action Thursday with a match in Durham against Duke.

In Houston, the North Carolina men's golf team finished eighth Saturday in the All-American Classic at the Atascocita Country Club.

The Tar Heels were paced individually by John Spelman, who finished at 290. Frank Fuhrer, second after 54 holes, blew to a 79 final round and finished at 291. Todd McGrew and Mike West had 296 totals, while David Whitfield completed Tar Heel scoring with 307.

Oklahoma State won the team title.
