for inclusion in fall bills

If you ever wondered exactly what your student fees were used for, you won't have to wonder anymore.

A breakdown of student fees will be inserted with student bills this fall. The breakdown will show a schedule of fees for undergraduates and graduate students.

Wayne R. Jones, associate vice chancellor of finance, said last week that Student Government requested the administration to include the breakdown of fees with the student bills.
