# UNC professor writes book on birds

UNC zoology professor Alan Feduccia says he is convinced that books written by scientists don't have to be unintelligible to the average reader.

And he adds that he hopes his new book, The Age of Birds, will convince others of that, too.

"This is my field of study. The book itself is, in every chapter, covering a topic I'm keenly interested in from the standpoint of research. The secret to this book was taking this information from the domain of scientists and bringing it down to where the average 'birder' can read and enjoy it." Feduccia said.

As an evolutionary biologist, Feduccia has concentrated on the study of birds, because they have played a large role in evolutionary theory. "That (the link between birds and evolution) is really my focal point," he said.

"There has never been a popular book on bird evolution written. This is the first," he said. "This book starts with dinosaurs and ends with sparrows."

In the four years Feduccia has been working on The Age of Birds, he also has been working on other books and publications. This latest book is his third in the past five years.

In addition, Feduccia was honorarily inducted in 1978 as research associate with the Department of Vertebrate Zoology in the National Museum of Natural History of the Smithsonian Institution.

Feduccia plans to write more books that would interest the general public. "I hope to have a book on the fossils of birds (for the general public) sometime," he said.

The Age of Birds, published by the Harvard University Press, should be released by Oct. 1.

"This (book) is my brainchild. It was something I had in mind for a long time. The field had never been synthesized. I was anxious to get all this material together for the first time," Feduccia said.


