# Duke knows it's an unlikely contender

DURHAM—Duke football coach Red Wilson was being very candid with members of the Atlantic Coast Conference Operation Football tour. "I didn't put out that bumper sticker that said 'Red Means Go,'" Wilson said. "Heavens no!"

In all probability, enthusiasm for the Duke football program will not come up with the "Red Means Go" or "Devlirium" levels advertised on the bumper stickers last year. In his second year as coach of the struggling Blue Devil program, Wilson simply won't have the material to work with to be a serious contender in the ACC. He'll tell you that.

Duke lacks the numbers, size and talent in the skill positions to seriously contend for the top spot. In fact, many suggest the Blue Devils will be hard pressed to win a single football game in 1980.

"This is the Duke story," Wilson said, plotting out his expectations for

the year. "We are definitely in a rebuilding year. We do have some talented players, but we just don't have the numbers to select from. In us you'll have the smallest squad in the ACC. We have 95 players now, but a few are injured so we're probably working with 90 players."

"We had so few skilled people last year that we had to recruit some backs just to go through drills," Wilson quipped.

As if the Blue Devils were not already thin enough in the backfield, Wilson announced that Craig Browning, Duke's top quarterback going into fall drills, will move to free safety. The change, Wilson said, was made because Browning was having passing problems.

"We noticed from the very outset of practice that Craig was having problems with accuracy," Wilson said. "The ball was sailing like a knuckleball. He wasn't getting much on it. Something happened in the back of his shoulder which changed his throwing motion."

The switch has reopened the quarterback dilemma for Duke, which according to Wilson will have the youngest quarterback corps in the

nation. "Brent Clinkscale (a sophomore) will be number one until someone beats him out," Wilson said. "The competition appears to be coming from two freshmen, Ben Bennett and Ron Sully."

Whoever inherits the job will have the most talented part of the Duke team—the receivers—to work with. Headed by juniors Ron Frederick and Cedric Jones, the receivers are highly touted in Duke's pass-oriented offense.

Frederick was the top receiver for the Blue Devils last year, catching 28 passes for 395 yards and three touchdowns. He, like Wilson, knows the Blue Devils have their work ahead of them this year.

"Last year, we had a lot of enthusiasm and slogans," Frederick said. "This year, we know what we have to do and we have a very business-like attitude. We're not unrealistic. We know we have a tough schedule, but we think we can win some ball games."

The Duke offensive unit is extremely young with only three seniors listed as starters for Duke's season opener against East Carolina on Sept. 6. Tackle Bubba Dowell and tight end Mike Fuqua will anchor the offensive line with Tee Moorman starting at center and Brian Baldinger and Paul Bacon at guards. Sophomore Tim Bumgarner, whom Wilson called "a future line great at Duke," will fill the other tackle spot.

Sophomore Greg Boone, characterized by Wilson as "a James McDougald type player," is the leading candidate for the fullback spot. Bobby Brower, David Snow and Chester Gee are battling for the tailback spot. Wilson said Brower and basketball star Gene Banks are the two best all-around athletes at Duke.

Defensively, Duke has more experience. "We have seven good defensive people, a good front five and two good linebackers," Wilson said. Six defensive starters return, including tackles F.A. Martin and Paul Heinshon

and ends Charles Bowser and Larry LeNoir. Junior Jimmy Tyson is the lone starting linebacker returning and the only veteran back in the secondary is Dennis Tabron. The secondary will be experienced, however, with seniors Eddie Brown and Gary Garstkewicz at free safety and strong safety.

"We've got an outstanding group of young people this year," Wilson said. "I'm not sure we are ready to compete against an almost all-senior team like North Carolina. Numbers can do wonders for you. But I am always by nature optimistic. I've preached at our kids to be positive, but I don't want them to be disappointed."

"It's awful hard to take people that have had problems and convert them overnight. You've got to have time to convert them. You can't win with losers. Our kids are talking like winners now."

## Ohio State No. 1; Heels picked 14th

The preseason Associated Press football poll ranks North Carolina at No. 14, one position higher than the Tar Heels were ranked in the final 1979 AP poll.

The results of the nationwide balloting by 65 sportswriters and broadcasters were released Sunday. Ohio State, runner-up to Alabama last year after losing the Rose Bowl, got 36 first-place votes and is ranked No. 1. Carolina is the only Atlantic Coast Conference team ranked by the AP.

## Virginia-man wins race

DURHAM—Guy Crane, a 25-year-old from Richmond, Va., took first place in a 15-kilometer Carolina Godiva Labor Day race here Monday.

Crane ran the race in 48:53 to outdistance Mike Kerner, also of Richmond, and Bryan Allif of Durham. Bill Hall, 40, took fourth place.

"We've got people here with ages ranging from four or five to over 60," said Walter High, president of the Godiva Club. Although most of

the runners were from the Triangle area, there were quite a few runners from South Carolina and Virginia, High said.

Jeanne Eldridge, a 24-year-old, was the first woman to complete the race and the 46th overall finisher. Tara Myler took second place in the women's division.

A fun run of 1.5 miles also was held. More than 500 persons participated in the two races.
