## Highlights

**Union Day**, a smorgasbord of activities sponsored by the Carolina Union, will be all day Friday. Featured events in the Pitt include: Jazz played by John Root at noon; human checkers; a concert by the Nee Niny Band at 2 p.m.; performances by Toad The Mime and juggler Ken Kaye at 3 p.m. Also, some Union special interest classes will be previewed in the Pit: Bellydancing at 4 p.m., Self-defense at 5 p.m., Tai Chi Ch'uan at 5:30 p.m., guitar at 6 p.m., and clogging at 7:30 p.m.

Also scheduled for the Pit are finger painting and face painting at 3 p.m. and roller skating starting at 7 p.m. Brother Yusuf and Friends, featuring Eve Cornelius, will perform Friday evening.

The Union Videotape Committee is sponsoring three special programs in conjunction with Union day. The first program is Recording Artists, which features footage of Billy Joel, Jackson Browne, Kris Kristofferson, Al Wilson and David Essex recording songs. The second program, Muhammed Ali: Skill Brains and Guts is a documentary about the legendary fighter. The third show is The National Lampoon Show and features Chevy Chase and John Belushi. The videotapes will be shown from 1:30-4 p.m. and 9:30-midnight Friday in the second-floor lounge of the Union. The programs will be shown every afternoon Sept. 8 through Sept. 12.

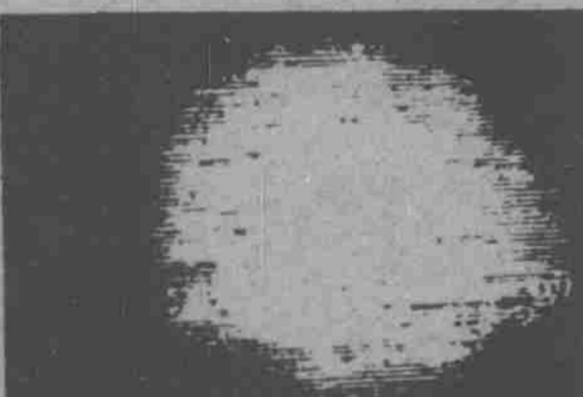
