#### Heels awaken to beat UNC-G

The members of the UNC volleyball team may have let their minds wander to next Tuesday's showdown with N.C. State when they lost the first game of their match against UNC-Greensboro 12-15 Monday night. But then they got down to the business of dispatching UNC-G and won the next three games 15-4, 15-0 and 15-12.

"That's why these matches against the weaker teams are important," said Terri Wallace. "The physical skills are there, but we need mental concentration all the time. The first game, we may have taken UNC-G too lightly."

Coach Beth Miller had nothing but praise for her team at this early stage in the season.

"Overall our game is right where it should be now. We need some improvement in a couple of areas, but there are no glaring weaknesses. We look pretty solid."

The Tar Heels are now 2-0 and head to Boone Thursday to take on Appalachian State. In the past UNC has had little trouble defeating ASU, but as Wallace said, "We're going to take one match at a time, one point at a time, and Appalachian comes before State."

# Soccer travels to High Point

The North Carolina men's soccer team will attempt to get its offense in gear again when it faces High Point at 3:30 p.m. today in High Point.

After exploding for 23 goals in three games, the Tar Heels were shut out 1-0 in the Mayor's Cup final Sunday by Duke.

On paper, High Point doesn't have the talent to go with UNC, but intrastate colleges play Carolina with a special interest that makes for close games, as witness last year's Tar Heel narrow 2-1

win over High Point.

"It's a compliment to Carolina,"

UNC defender Jay Ainslie said.

"Everybody wants to beat you. We've had games with North Carolina schools like Campbell and East Carolina that shouldn't compare with us, but once they get on the field they're flying high at game time."

Carolina enters the game with a 4-1 record. It returns home to play highly respected Appalachian State at 2 p.m. Saturday on Fetzer Field.

# Qualified optimism marks golf preseason

After a competitive qualifying trial that saw seven golfers within 20 strokes of each other after 72 holes, members of the UNC women's golf team can hardly wait for the 1980 season to open.

"The girls turned in the lowest preseason qualifing scores that we have ever had," coach Dot Gunnells said. "We have six or seven really strong players."

Freshman Kathy Ayers, who qualified seventh on the 10-member team with an average score of 81, agreed. "The top seven or so were pretty close," she said.

The Tar Heels hope this depth can help them overcome the loss of four players who earned All-Region All-American honors last season. Stephanie Kornegay, Janet Haire, Susan Cary and Page Kennedy were picked among the best women golfers in five Southern states.

Gunnells hopes veterans Carla Daniel, Linda Mescan, Jill Nesbitt, Cathy Reynolds, Maureen Long and Cathy Graham can fill the leadership void left by the four departing seniors.

"Those four will never be replaced," Daniel said. "I know they helped me a lot—they gave me a lot of support when I needed it."

Daniel led the qualifying with an average score of 75 and will play No. 1 when the Heels open their fall season Thursday in the Penn State Invitiational at State College, Pa.

Mescan qualified second with an average of 76, while Nesbitt, who set a women's course record at Finley Golf Course during one round with a 69, Reynolds and freshman Lucy Lofland qualified with 77s.

Lofland, the North Carolina high school women's champion the past two years, wasn't the only newcomer to make the team. Other newcomers making the squad include Ayers, sophomore Kim Grace and freshman Jeanette Wynolst.

Several of the players performed well last year. Mescan won the individual title in the NCAIAW state championships as a sophomore. Reynolds won the South Jersey Amateur and finished second in the New Jersey Amateur. And Daniel took Patty Rizzo, the eventual runner-up, to the 19th hole before losing in the early

rounds of the U.S. Women's Amateur.

Daniel said this year's team could be the strongest in North Carolina's history. "Last year (when the team won the Tar Heel Invitational and the Big Four Tournament) we didn't play up to our potential," she said.

"This year we've been playing well—we should do all right if we play like we have in practice."

Daniel said she doesn't feel that much pressure by being picked No. 1.

"It makes me work harder—if I want to stay there it makes me work that much harder just to make sure I stay where I am."

The Tar Heels will get a good indication of how strong they are in the

season opener at Penn State. Host Penn State was ranked in the Top 20 last season.

"There will be a lot of Big 10 and lvy League schools there," Gunnells said. "Its a big tournament for the first one."

From there, where they play Thursday through Saturday, the Tar Heels travel straight to Appalchian State to play in the Blue Ridge Mountain Invitational at Boone.

Gunnells has selected Daniel, Mescan, Nesbitt, Reynolds and Ayers to participate in the Penn State Invitational.

Long and Lofland will replace two of those at the ASU event.

The highlight of UNC's season will be the Lady Tar Heel Tournament, which runs Nov. 1-3 at Finley. Gunnells said the field will include five of the top 10 schools in the country, including Georgia, Florida and Ohio State.

## 'Bama 1st; Heels 13th

The Crimson Tide of Alabama, striving to become the first team in college football history to capture three consecutive national championships, moved past Ohio State and into first place Tuesday in this week's Associated Press poll.

Alabama and Ohio State were tied with 30 first-place votes apiece but the Crimson Tide, idle last weekend following its opening-game 26-3 win over Georgia Tech, jumped from second place to the top spot with 1,232 of a possible 1,280 points from a nationwide panel of 64 sportswriters and sportscasters.

The Buckeyes of Ohio State, who rallied from a 21-3 second-period deficit to turn back Syracuse 31-21, slipped to the runner-up position with 1,216 points.

Last week, Ohio State led Alabama 33-22 in first-place ballots and 1,140-1,121 in points with 59 voters participating.

Oklahoma and Southern California moved up one position each to third and fourth place, respectively, while Pittsburgh dropped from third to fifth.
