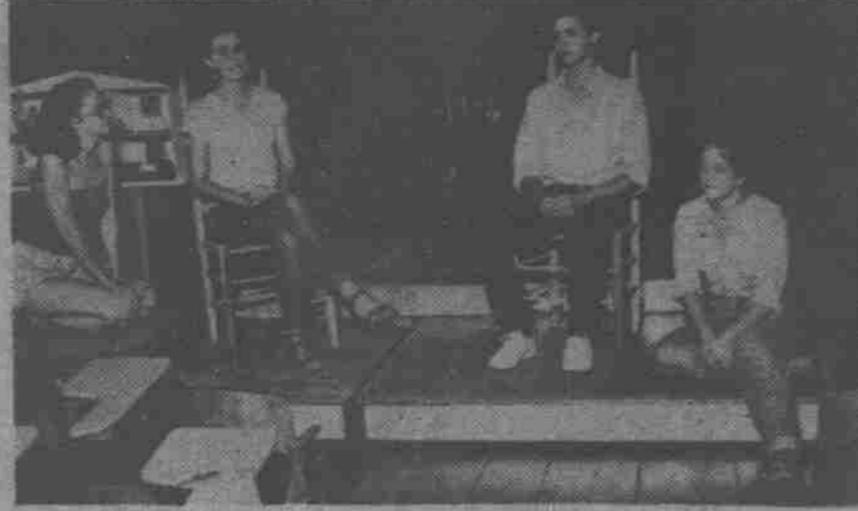


Reader's group presents drama

My Sister's Marriage, a chamber theater production of the short story by Cynthia Marshall Rich, will be presented today and tomorrow in Bingham 103 at 8 p.m. Admission is free.

A production of the UNC-CH Reader's Theatre, *My Sister's Marriage* is the story of Sarah Ann, a young woman who lives a restricted life with her father and her older sister, Olive, as her only real companions.

The drama emphasizes the sharing and conflicts inherent in such a close-knit relationship. A major struggle occurs as Olive and Sarah Ann try to gain the attentions and love of their father, a rather stern and hard-boiled figure.

Stacy Cox, a speech communications graduate student, adapted the short story for stage and also serves as director. "One of the challenges of doing this adaptation," she said, "was deciding who would speak at which time and when the narrator would be used."

The production will be performed in the style of chamber theater. A type of reader's theater, the chamber production places more emphasis on narration than does traditional reader's theater.

"What is exciting about chamber theater is that it performs

short stories as short stories," Cox said. "You don't lose the richness and color commonly lost when a novel is adapted into a play or movie. Instead, the emphasis is on bringing the original literature to life."

This semester, the Reader's Theatre will present three more productions. The first will be an anthology of poetry stressing parent-child relationships. Next, a multimedia presentation will be produced based on the works of Donald Barthelme. This adaptation will combine dance, music and visual media. The final production centers around North Carolina folklore told in reader's theater style.

Cast members of the current production are: JoAnn Garner as Sarah Ann the narrator; Maria Bolick as Sarah Ann the character; Melanie Hood as Olive; and Ralph Kennedy as the father.

UNC women win soccer tournament

Nancy Clary scored from 35 feet and North Carolina recorded its sixth shutout of the season as the UNC women's soccer team defeated Virginia Tech 1-0 to win the inaugural Soccer Bowl '80 tournament Sunday in Washington, D.C.

The Tar Heel offense struggled without the services of tri-captain Janet Rayfield, who hyperextended her left leg in the first half of the opening game, but the defense rose to the occasion, blanketing both Tech and Carolina's semifinal opponent, Virginia, 1-0.

"The tournament was good for maturing our players, particularly on defense," UNC coach Anderson Dorrance said. "The defense isn't always involved in the game if it's a rout, but it was tested by Tech and it held. The two shutouts in a row are indicative of its improvements since last year."

Although all of UNC's games were close, Tech gave Carolina the greatest difficulty, Dorrance said.

"Tech didn't shoot that much, but they dominated 50 percent of the game," he said. "They had nice players and the flow of the game wasn't ours. I'd say Tech dominated the first half and we dominated the second half."

Liz Crowley provided the only scoring in the semifinal against the Cavaliers with a goal off a Kerry Judd corner kick.

Clary scored twice and Sarah Marr added a third to spark a come from behind 3-2 Tar Heel victory over James Madison in the first round.

Rise in strep cases reported

An unusually high number of students have been treated for strep throat at the Student Health Service recently, an SHS doctor said Monday.

SHS Dr. James McCutchan said doctors have been treating six to eight cases a day. "We're treating more than we would expect, not large numbers. It's not an epidemic," he said.

Most students treated complained of sore throats and the symptoms of a cold.

After strep throat, which is contagious, has been correctly identified by a throat culture, it is treated with antibiotics.

The treatment should continue for ten days to prevent any recurrence of the illness.

"Strep is usually common in January when the daylight is short. It's 91 (degrees) outside with summer weather. This many cases is unusual," McCutchan said.
