relocate. The money she received for her home appraisal and her relocations funds would help pay for the new dwelling Hooper said.

Chapel Hill Town Manager Gene Shipman said that it is legal to condemn the property of a resident who will not concede the land. He said the law is a part of local and state powers known as eminent domain.

Smith said he opposed taking the Gattis land because he believed that Gattis had not been given enough information about the move. He said he had not been to talk to her, because her lawyer, James Farlow, had made it clear that the situation would be discussed only through him.

"Nobody has been able to communicate with her," Smith said. "I was hoping she would find out what she would receive as a resident of relocation. I have a feeling she would probably move."

Hooper, however, disagreed with Smith in saying he thought adequate information had been given to Gattis. He said the Chapel Hill town attorney, had been unable to achieve successful negotiation with Farlow.

"He (Farlow) has not returned

should have." The only alternative other than the condemnation resolution would have been to extend the street around the Gattis house, Thorpe said. He explained that this alternative would have allowed the existing danger to continue.

To the outsider, Thorpe admitted the situation looked insensitive on the town's part.

"That's not the situation," Thorpe said. "I would have been the first to holler over (that). I wouldn't approve anything until I felt sure that (we wouldn't be taking advantage of her)."

Human error blamed for Atlanta explosion

ATLANTA (AP)-Human error was to blame for a boiler explosion at a housing project day-care center that claimed the lives of four children and a teacher, according to a police report released Wednesday.

The report blamed the Oct. 13 explosion in part on the rewiring of a safety device designed to shut off the boiler when water was too low, and in part on the fact that the boiler was lit by "inadequately trained personnel."

The report, released by Atlanta Public Safety Commissioner Lee Brown, said investigators concluded "absolutely no foul play" was involved.

The fatal explosion aggravated racial tension in this city already edgy over the slayings of 10 black children and the disappearances of four others.

Pope issues new celibacy guidelines

VATICAN CITY (AP)-Pope John Paul II, ending a two-year freeze on granting dispensation from vows of priestly celibacy, has issued new guidelines to allow Roman Catholic priests to leave the priesthood and marry but still remain in the church.

The decision removes a major source of tension in the church created by the pope's refusal to process almost 5,000 petitions on file from priests seeking release from their vows, Vatican sources said.

The celibacy rule is believed to be a main reason behind the sharp increase in the defections of Roman Catholic priests in recent years.

Nixon testifies on intelligence break-ins



New twist in Klan trial

GREENSBORO (AP)-Defense lawyers focused Wednesday on two potential witnesses who were not called-a federal agent and a police informer-during closing arguments in the first-degree murder trial of six Ku Klux Klansmen and Nazis.

The six are each charged with five counts of first-degree murder arising from a bloody confrontation between a caravan of Klansmen and Nazis and a group of Communist Workers Party demonstrators last Nov. 3.


Five Communists died in the battle, which was fought with sticks and guns.

Lawyer Robert Douglas said federal agent Bernie Butkovich did not testify' during the lengthy trial either because he' knew no violence was planned or because the government participated in events leading to the shootout.

Douglas recalled testimony that Butkovich infiltrated a Forsyth County Nazi group and may have attended a planning session two days before the


