deliberations resume. The jury had voted Friday to deliberate today, which is Veterans Day, a federal holiday, if they had not reached a verdict by Monday at 5 p.m.

The five possible verdicts that could be reached are: guilty of first-degree murder, first-degree murder by premeditation and deliberation, second-degree murder, voluntary manslaughter or a verdict of not guilty.

The defendants facing these possible verdicts are: Jack Wilson Fowler 27

and Roland Wayne Wood, 35, both of Winston-Salem; Jerry Paul Smith, 33, of Maiden; Coleman Blair Pridmore, 37, and Lawrence Gene Morgan, 28, both of Lincolnton; and David Wayne Matthews, 24, of Newton.

Prosecutors have argued that the Klansmen and Nazis, who arrived at the rally site in a nine-vehicle caravan, went to the rally "spoiling for a fight" and filled with "bigotry, hatred and prejudice."

British Labor leader elected

LONDON (AP)—Michael Foot, a 67-year-old left-winger, was elected the new leader of Britain's opposition Labor Party today, narrowly beating the center-right candidate, Denis Healey, 63.

Foot, a one-time radical socialist, scraped home by 10 votes ahead of Healey in a runoff ballot among the 268 Labor Members of Parliament to succeed former Prime Minister James Callaghan.

Callaghan, 68, resigned last month as head of Britain's strife-torn socialist movement.

Sleuths to track Atlanta killer

ATLANTA (AP)—Five sleuths known for having solved murders in their own cities converged in Atlanta Monday to begin helping local officials find the killer, or killers, responsible for the deaths or disappearances of 15 black children

Meanwhile, in New Jersey, a self-proclaimed psychic who spent four days in Atlanta aiding investigators predicted a major break in the case could occur Wednesday.

Kliban and kitties don't mix

NEW YORK (AP)—Bernard Kliban, author of the immensely popular book Cat, says he has sworn off furry, four-footed felines for good.

In the current issue of *People* magazine, the 45-year-old cartoon artist said he was allergic to cats as a child, and he doesn't own any now. The self-made millionaire has declared he never will draw another kitty.

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Baptists comment on Moral Majority

GREENSBORO (AP)—A Baptist leader wasted little time reaffirming the church's political independence from other organizations as the 150th Baptist Convention opened Monday.

We are concerned with moral conditions and moral problems," said Edwin Bullock, Baptist Men executive director. "But we pride ourselves on being independent. A church operates on its own ideas."

Bullock, a Raleigh resident, said his group had no connections with the Moral Majority, the religious and political organization that many political observers said was instrumental in the election of several conservatives Tuesday.

The Rev. Jerry Falwell's Moral Majority and the Baptist Men "are only brother and sister, not the same," said Bullock. The Moral Majority draws much of its support from various religious sects.

While Bullock acknowledged that a lot of the support for Moral Majority may come from Baptists, he said they

were attracted by the political, not religious, persuasion of Moral Majority.

Bullock stressed that the role of the Baptist Men was to address causes and sponsor mission groups to other parts of

sponsor mission groups to other parts of the nation and foreign countries.

He said the group's most recent work had been to address alcohol and drug abuse, and its newest undertaking would

be to combat pornography.

Any entry into the political arena would be disaster, Bullock said. "Our people would be basically opposed."

Donald Greene, president of the

Baptist Men, echoed the feelings of Bullock. "I don't get caught up in theological discussion," he said. "Every church is independent.

In a convention address Monday, Marian Grant told the North Carolina Minister's Wives group that, "Our culture embodies the belief that one sex is strong, one is weak. The fact is, both are strong and both are weak.

"We have seen progress in the last 25 years but inequality is still the women's situation," Grant said. "Quiet acceptance is the one prescription given by society. We would do well to follow the example of Christ who swept aside tradition and treated women as equals."



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
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
