"Part of the problem is that Carolina is so big and it's hard to generate interest all over campus," Jones said.

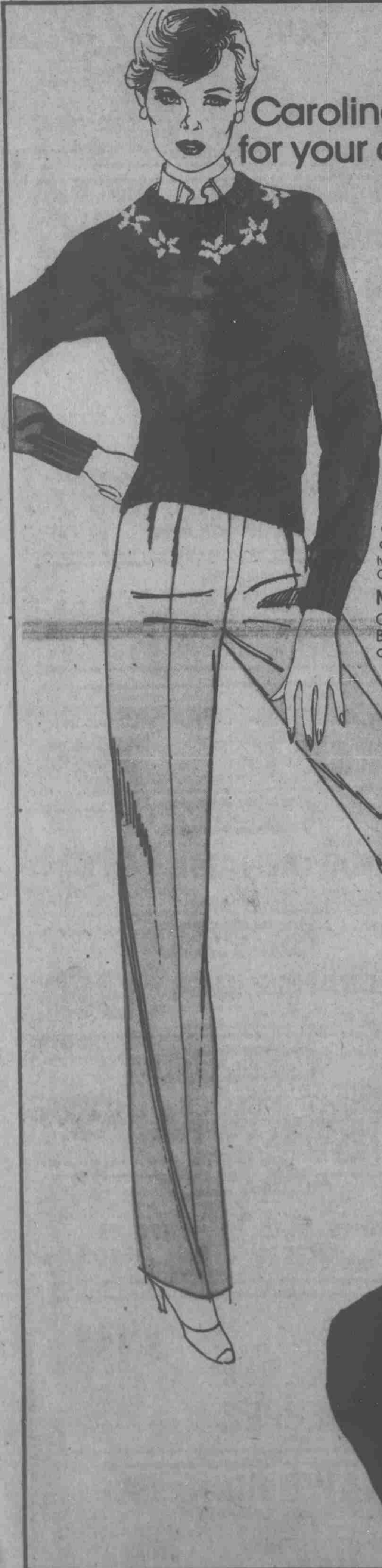
Although she sent information about the pageant to all the fraternities, sororities and dorms, Jones received only four entries.
