## Couples to compete

O.K. you love-crazed Carolina couples. Marty Pomerantz has devised a special event especially for you.

On Sunday, Feb. 15, you will have the chance to show just how well you work and play together as a team in the IM-Rec Sports Program's inaugural "Valentine's Couples Competition," set for 2 p.m. in and around the IM-Rec complex.

The purpose of this event, according to organizers Beverly Rowe and Corbi Bulluck of Pomerantz's P.E. 127 (Intramural and Extramural Administration) class, is to choose the most versatile couples here at UNC.

To do this, Rowe and Bulluck will have the couples participate in a variety of competitive and non-competitive activities. Some of the events offered are co-ed bundling, grocery cart relay, obstacle course, dashes, foul shooting and bowling. Points will be awarded for each event and tallied to determine the winning couple, Rowe said.

Because of the variety of activities, several facilities will be used. Participants should report to the IM-Rec office by 2 p.m. on the 15th.

Deadline for entering this event is Wed., Feb. 11 by 5 p.m. in the IM-Rec office.

## Teague, Pika, DU lead point race

Even though you might try to change things, some things never change. Some of the residence hall IM managers might think that as a result of the newly revised men's competitive point system totals that were announced last week by the IM-Rec office.

Some residence hall units were merged in the new system because of the larger number of women in some of the dorms now, as compared with the number when the former system was devised several years ago, and because of the consistently poor participation rate in some of the dorms.

Dorm (units) in STOWE and Henderson Residence Colleges were combined to form one unit respectively, Morrison and James were cut back in the number of units, and Ehringhaus was made one unit.

But when all the dust caused by these changes was cleared, Teague A, Granville DW, defending champion Lewis and Teague B, all perennial winners, were still comfortably on top.

Teague A, the most consistent residence hall unit winner of recent years before being dethroned last year by Lewis, is leading with 507 points.

In the fraternity division, Pika and defending champ Delta Upsilon (DU) is fighting out the lead, but both are far ahead of third-place Pika. DU has won the frat point championship two out of the last three years.

Assoc. IM-Rec Director Marty Pomerantz revised the point system this year because of instant scheduling.

Because this new scheduling system, used in football, volleyball, basketball and softball, allows each team to play more games than the old system did, the revised point system credits the teams that do play more.

Other than that revision, the point system is like the one used last year, Pomerantz said.

The point system, a tradition at UNC, is designed to award the top IM units based on participation and

achievement. Points are given for teams entered and advancing in the play-offs. Points are deducted for forfeits and poor sportsmanship.

Competition is divided into major, minor and individual events. Individual sports include track and field and swimming where points are awarded to the units per individual (up to 15) entered.

Limits are placed on the number of competitive teams a unit may enter and in the number of individuals for which points can be awarded. A detailed explanation of the system can be obtained at the IM-Rec office in Woollen.

The point system is only used in the men's competitive division because of its residence nature. Grad/ind teams are included in the men's competitive division, but are not included in the point system.

Women participants decided several years ago not to be included in a point system. Pomerantz said he would use the system for women's residence halls and sororities if interest is great enough.

Point champion in the residence hall and fraternity divisions at the end of the IM season will receive a plaque given by the IM-Rec program. In the past, the Interfraternity Council (IFC) has awarded the fraternity champion with a plaque (or trophy) of its own.

## Pomerantz likes associate position

"My basic job is trying to stay out of everyone else's way," said the remarkably witty Associate IM-Rec Director Marty Pomerantz.

So much for job descriptions but he does do that well.

Last spring's referendum has transformed Pomerantz from Assistant Director to Associate Director, or from doer to over-seeer. He now has two assistant directors under him, one responsible for scheduling and the other for facilities and faculty-staff. Pomerantz used to have all three of those responsibilities.

So what does this energetic carpet-bagger have to do now besides teach in the P.E. Department and work on his doctorate?

"I am responsible for over-seeing all the programming aspects of the IM-Rec program," he said. "I have my finger in most everything that goes on (in the program)."

So if the director's job can be described by fiscal responsibilities, Pomerantz' job can be described by "day-to-day" or "practical" program operations.

Pomerantz is a native of The Bronx, New York. He was graduated from The State University of New York at Binghamton (Binghamton State) and received his master's degree from Michigan State University. After he received his master's, he stayed in East Lansing for two years coordinating the school's open recreation program.

It was this emphasis on recreation that he brought to Carolina in 1976. Coming into a program that was extremely strong in traditional competitive activities, he gradually established new recreational activities without taking away from the competitive ones.

He admits favoring the non-competitive philosophy but he says the two

(competitive and recreation) can "absolutely go hand-in-hand."

Pomerantz can be credited (or blamed) for many of the special events in the program, such as this month's "Valentine's Couples Competition." He also took a growing trend around the country in IM scheduling and revised it a bit to come up with UNC's own "instant scheduling."

"Yeah, I work with Janice in trying to iron out the kinks in this new system," he said. Pomerantz likes the new system and will probably keep it, but he wants input from the students.

The associate IM-Rec director is by definition more available to the students than the director. Pomerantz says students should contact him if they "want to learn some nice running routes," or if they would like to baby-sit for the apple-of-his-eye son, Adam, (frequently seen around Woollen riding on his dad's shoulders), or on a more serious note, if they have any activity ideas or questions or problems with the present program.

Students should drop by to see Pomerantz about anything in the IM-Rec program. He needs the company as he is trying very hard to stay out of everyone else's way.
