

Student turnout low at hearings

The Food Service Advisory Committee had an open hearing in Cobb Residence Hall Wednesday to discuss projected improvements in campus food services, but only three students showed up. Committee members outnumbered students 2-1.

FSAC chairman, business administration professor Douglas Elvers, said the purpose of the open hearing was to get student input on the proposals offered and to come up with other ideas. "I think, in one sense, we certainly would like to have had a bigger student turnout. I thought we had a good discussion last night (Wednesday)," Elvers said, adding that it was unfortunate that more students did not attend. "This is an opportunity for students to express their thoughts," he said.

Problems discussed at the meeting included long lines, scarce seating space,

crowded kitchen quarters, and outdated kitchen equipment.

The committee has come up with several options to address these problems, student committee member Alisa Breedlove, a junior, said.

Three of the options included renovating the first floor of Lenoir Hall in two years when the Art Department is moved into another building. One option including adding a second floor in Lenoir Hall to accommodate banquets and dinners.

Another proposal was to close down the fast food service in the Union and move it into the renovated areas of Lenoir Hall.

One option offered by the committee would change Chase Cafeteria from an all-you-can-eat cafeteria with hot meals into a fast food snackbar. This would cut costs down at Chase, which has been depending on funds from Fast Break and Lenoir Hall to pay for its use.

of Lenoir Hall. Although this portion would not solve any of the long-term problems, it is considerably less costly, Alvers said.

The cost of these options ranges from \$52,000 to \$410,000, which would mean a student activity fee ranging from \$1.30 to \$10.25 per semester. But the committee has not decided on how it will finance the renovations yet.

Two more open hearings are scheduled for next week: Monday, March 2 at 7 p.m. in the first floor lounge of Morrison and Wednesday, March 4 at 3 p.m. in room 202-204 of the Union.

Sullivan said he was also considering opening up Chase for a la carte meals and all-you-can-eat to see if that would bring in more students. The idea of putting in a pizza parlor at Chase — including pizza delivery to residence halls — was also discussed.

The final option suggested was to renovate the Pine Room in the basement

"We thought it was ridiculous that ... our brothers and sisters were slaving and working for sub-minimum wages," Cureton Johnson said. "The protest was a focal point for dissatisfaction. At the time, it was the mood of the '60s — King had been killed, the Panthers were being exterminated by the police. All ingredients came together."

In protest, Cureton Johnson said, a group of about 20 black students raided the cafeteria, turning over tables, breaking cases and destroying food. About 30 students later took possession of Manning Hall and established it as "headquarters." Once again, state troopers were on the scene.

"I remember standing face-to-face with 12 highway patrolmen," Johnson said. The minister, who described himself as an introvert in high school, said, "I was doing things I had never dreamed of doing. I was turned off by the system — from the government down to the UNC system — which was unresponsive."

The BSM held its first Coronation Ball in 1971 to promote black culture. At the annual fall event, a BSM queen is crowned. The Opeyo Dancers, Ebony Readers/Onyx Theatre and Gospel Choir are BSM subgroups that also were formed to promote black culture.

In recent years, the BSM has continued to voice its views. It has been actively involved in both the UNC-HEW dispute and the case involving Sonja Stone, the former chairman of the Afro-American studies curriculum who was denied tenure.

The BSM has also advocated the creation of an Office of Minority Affairs and has supported Associate Dean Hayden B. Renwick of the College of Arts and Sciences, who charged that the University used unfair admission procedures for black students.

Reagan considering blockade

FAYETTEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said Thursday the Reagan administration is considering a blockade of Cuba to try to halt arms shipments to guerrilla forces in El Salvador but is not considering a return to the military draft.

"No option is being ruled out, nor has any option been adopted" on El Salvador, Weinberger said.

Weinberger said American personnel are in the Central American country on a training mission for the El Salvador government.

"We're talking about very small numbers of people who are nowhere near any zone that could be called a combat zone," he said. "They are giving general instructions on ways of dealing with guerrilla insurgency."

Atlanta death toll rises to 19

ATLANTA (AP) — A black boy found dead in December was added Thursday to the list of slayings and disappearances being investigated by a special police task force, raising the total number of deaths to 19.

Public Safety Commissioner Lee Brown added the name of 15-year-old Patrick Rogers to the list. In addition to 19 deaths, the task force is investigating the disappearances of two black boys.

Rogers, who lived in southeast Atlanta, was found Dec. 7 in the Chattahoochee River in Cobb County, northwest of the city and outside the Atlanta police jurisdiction.

Meanwhile, police said two black children reported missing earlier this week have been found safe and returned to their parents. Both boys — 14-year-old Termal Heard and 10-year-old Dempster D. Williams — were back with their families Wednesday night, police said.

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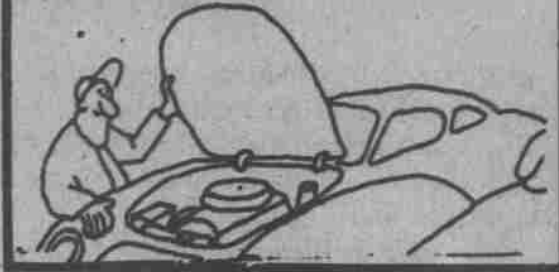
