# Last'Home' performance tonight

They hail from the Big Apple, but members of The Negro Ensemble Company brought a homespun flavor to Memorial Hall Monday night in their superb performance of the comedy Home.

The ensemble members, two females and one male, repeated their performance of the play, written by North Carolina

native Samm-Art Williams, last night and will appear at 8 tonight in Memorial Hall for their final performance.

The production is part of the eightday Black Arts Festival, sponsored by the Black Student Movement.

Home is a semi-autobiographical play that traces 13 years in the life of Cephus Miles, a black native of the fictitious Cross Roads, N.C. It is filled with anecdotes, humor, suspense and black dialogue.
