

Military stops West Bank merchants strike

RAMALLAH, Occupied West Bank — Israeli military authorities jailed three influential Palestinians, confined others to their towns and dispatched troops to patrol streets of this restive Arab city Tuesday to quell a planned merchants' strike.

The action came after a week of scattered demonstrations challenging Israel's occupation of the West Bank of the Jordan River and Defense Minister Ariel Sharon's policy of replacing military authorities with civilian administrators.

Despite the show of force, striking shopkeepers and students shut down Arab East Jerusalem, which unlike the West Bank is under police rather than army jurisdiction. The strike was in response to a call by West Bank unions.

Police made no attempt to reopen the Jerusalem shops, but reportedly arrested Ibrahim Ishaq, head of the West Bank Engineers Union.

Others jailed were Akram Haniya, editor of the radical A-Shaab newspaper, and Azami Shuabi, member of the El Bireh town council, Defense Ministry spokesman Danny Weinreich said. The Al-Fajr newspaper was closed earlier this week for 10 days for publishing allegedly inflammatory material.

Sharon told a news conference Monday that his new policy was "to make life as easy as possible for the local population while we will be very firm and strong on terrorist activity or any other violence or disorder."

In Ramallah, 10 miles north of Jerusalem, army jeeps and soldiers with night sticks cruised streets to forestall the threatened strike.

Troops wheeled a metal-cutting machine through the city center, an implied threat to shopkeepers that the army would break open their locks if they followed the strike call.

Brother Joseph Loewenstein, chancellor of the Vatican-sponsored Bethlehem University, said the 1,200-student school has been unable to hold classes this month

because of unrest. A minor demonstration was reported in Bethlehem on Tuesday.

In Jerusalem, Israel radio reported that Arab youths stoned a bus, injuring the driver and a woman passenger with glass splinters.

Demonstrations were sparked last week at Bir Zeit University near Ramallah, the area's main Palestinian university where students threw stones and barricaded themselves in a building. Authorities closed the 2,000-student university last Wednesday.

Weinreich said an unknown number of Bir Zeit students were restricted to their towns. Bir Zeit's president, Gabi Baramki, was called for more questioning for the second day Tuesday.

Baramki told The Associated Press he and four other college administrators were barred from leaving town. A sixth official, Vice President Izzat Gourani, was under house arrest. Baramki refused to speak further, saying he was under orders from the military.

Chapel Hill bus ridership level stable for past year

Although on some mornings bus riders groan about crowding, Bob Godding, Chapel Hill's transportation director, said ridership is about the same this year as it was last year.

"Ridership has been pretty much stable," Godding said. "There have been only minor changes." September 1981 ridership was .5 percent below September 1980 figures. This September, 258,158

people rode buses in Chapel Hill and Carrboro.

Godding said changes have not been in ridership levels but rather in service levels. For example, there has been expanded service on the D route and improved midday service on the G route.

Routes that operate at night now do so under extended hours, although the number of buses running at night has decreased, Godding said.

Also, buses no longer run on the K route, which serviced the Kroger Plaza

Shopping Center. Kroger was a park-and-ride route which meant that riders had to furnish their own transportation to Kroger before riding into town.

The UNC traffic office noted an increase in bus passes issued by the University this year. Fewer students, however, are opting to pay cash for the passes and are putting them on their University bills instead.

In the first quarter of this year 3,645

full-service bus passes were issued by the Campus Traffic Office, including annual, academic year and semester passes.

The traffic office, which issued the \$60 full-service passes, also issued 3,702 parking permits that cost \$54 each for one year.

Some students buy a bus pass and a parking permit because they ride a bus to get from the parking lot where they park their cars to their classes on campus.

Court rules on church liability

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal appeals court ruled Tuesday that church organizations were not immune from antitrust laws, even if their actions were motivated by religious concerns.

The ruling rejected claims of the Catholic Church which argued that application of antitrust laws to its actions would violate its First Amendment right to freely exercise religion.

The unanimous ruling by a three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia said antitrust laws never before had been applied against a religious organization.

The decision, while establishing the important legal principle, told a lower federal court to decide whether the church group involved actually violated antitrust laws.

She said many business decisions were made in male social settings like bars and locker rooms. "Men in top jobs bring in more men," she said.

Holcomb said Gov. Jim Hunt had been supportive of women in the state. He recently appointed a female judge, former Rep. Trish Hunt, and he has three women in his cabinet.

"That is quite the opposite of what (President Ronald) Reagan is doing," she said. She said the appointment of Sandra Day O'Connor as Supreme Court Justice

was the biggest thing the president has done for women. Cuts in federal job training programs will hurt women, she said.

However, some federal guidelines discourage sex discrimination. The Equal Pay Act of 1963 said men and women should be paid the same in jobs requiring equal skill, effort and responsibility, said Gerald Kiel, regional attorney for the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's district office in Charlotte.

Reagan complained that Congress had not yet sent him one appropriations bill for the bookkeeping year that began Oct. 1 — and the money measures now pending would exceed spending targets.

House Majority Leader Jim Wright, D-Tex., reported that 11 of the 13 regular appropriations bills were tied up in the Republican Senate — and the two which already had not passed the House were being held up for White House comment.

"I stand ready to veto any bill that abuses the limited resources of the taxpayer," Reagan

said. "It is ironic that those who would have us assume blame for this economic mess are the ones who created it."

Earlier in the day, several Senate Democrats accused the administration of deliberately deceiving the nation about the economy. Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., said Reagan was pursuing a program that amounted to the "Hoover nonsense that prosperity is just around the corner ... just wait until spring."

Reagan acknowledged that his goal of balancing the federal budget by 1984 had become "an unlikelyhood" because of continuing high inflation. He declined to set a new target date.
