

Governor touts state in Japan

RALEIGH — Opening a 10-day trade mission in the Orient, Gov. Jim Hunt told Japanese government and industry officials in Tokyo Monday that North Carolina was the best location in the United States for foreign investment.

Hunt said North Carolina had the lowest construction costs in the nation. He also pointed to the state's new \$24-million microelectronics center, encouraging research and manufacturing in computer technology, and the recently announced establishment of a biotechnology center.

North Carolina had no laws against foreign investment and "few barriers to improvements in productivity," he said. "Those are some of the reasons why, in 1980, more foreign-owned firms announced industrial plants in North Carolina than in any other state in the United States," Hunt said.

Hunt made the remarks at the sixth annual meeting of the Southeast United States-Japan Association at the Imperial Hotel. Hunt's press office in Raleigh released a summary of his comments.

Hunt said that a \$37 million Ajinomoto plant, manufacturing amino acids, would be dedicated in Raleigh next April. He

said there were about 20 Japanese companies doing business in North Carolina.

The governor also met with officials of Japan Tobacco and Salt Association to encourage the continued purchase of North Carolina flue-cured tobacco. Japan Tobacco and Salt is the single largest foreign buyer of North Carolina leaf.

Hunt encouraged the tobacco and salt association to expand its use of the North Carolina's state ports at Wilmington and Morehead City.

Hunt also met with Bunzo Watanabe, head of Ajinomoto, presenting him with a certificate naming him Ambassador at Large for North Carolina.

Three legislators suspended from Parliament

LONDON — Three Northern Ireland Protestant legislators, enraged over Britain's failure to contain IRA violence, screamed abuse in the House of Commons Monday and one threatened to make the province "ungovernable." They were suspended indefinitely from Parliament.

Police with specially trained dogs, meanwhile, hunted in and around the British capital for a huge cache of explosives in what Scotland Yard called the biggest search of its kind. They said they believed 500 pounds of gelignite were hidden by Irish Republican Army guerrillas responsible for a recent wave of bombings in London.

In Belfast, the IRA issued a statement on its assassination of Protestant legislator the Rev. Robert Bradford in Belfast last weekend, saying people who whipped up anti-IRA sentiment "cannot expect to remain immune forever."

Protestant legislators denounced British pleas for calm and said they would set up vigilante-type groups unless Britain cracks down on the outlawed, predominantly Roman Catholic, IRA, which for 12 years has waged a bloody campaign to drive the British out and unite the province with the mainly Catholic Irish Republic.

Hardline Protestant leader the Rev. Ian Paisley and two colleagues started shouting when Northern Ireland Secretary James Prior, addressing the House of Commons, urged restraint by both Protestants and Roman

Catholics in the province.

Belfast legislator Peter Robinson yelled, "The blood of Ulster is on your hands!" as Prior said Bradford's slaying was an IRA attempt "quite deliberately to use murder to provoke further murder."

Speaker George Thomas, shouting above the uproar of English legislators demanding "Out! Out! Get out!" ordered officials to remove Paisley, Robinson and another Belfast legislator, John McQuade, as the trio continued screaming abuse from a gallery above their regular seats on the floor of the Commons.

The three, all members of Paisley's Ulster Democratic Unionist Party, were suspended indefinitely and the Commons resumed debate on the Bradford killing after a 15-minute adjournment. There are 12 seats for Northern Ireland legislators in the Commons — all but two held by Protestants.

Paisley said he believed other Northern Ireland members of Parliament would be slain by the IRA "before Christmas."

Outside Parliament, Paisley declared, "We can make Northern Ireland ungovernable and show to Mrs. Thatcher (the British Prime Minister) she cannot govern except with the (Protestant) majority."

Paisley plans a huge rally in Belfast next Monday to demonstrate Protestant anger at Britain's failure to contain the IRA — and fears that London intends ultimately to hand over the Protestant-dominated province to the mainly Catholic Republic of Ireland.

"We are speaking of defying the government. Yes, sir," Paisley told reporters. "We can see that no district council can work and no administration can carry on in Northern Ireland."

Paisley added: "The IRA has done something that is going to be the turning of the road."

Paisley, evidently referring to Protestant vigilante groups, said Mrs. Thatcher had refused his demands to set up a "third force" in addition to the 13,000 British troops in the province and its mainly Protestant police force.

"We will have to show her a third force has already started." He added, however, it would be "absolutely wrong for Protestants to take up arms against Catholics."

Earlier, Scotland Yard canceled all police leave in the capital and began a search in London and four neighboring counties for the suspected IRA arms cache — sufficient to make 50 bombs, police said.

Officers and dogs were scouring more than 300,000 garages and other buildings hoping to find the explosives and the IRA gang that police believe has set off four bombs in London in six weeks, killing three people.

"There is an Irish terrorist group operating in London and we have strong grounds to believe they have access to something like 500 pounds of explosive material," Scotland Yard Deputy Assistant Commissioner George Rushbrook said at a news conference.

Hinckley saved from suicide

WASHINGTON (AP) — Accused presidential assailant John W. Hinckley Jr. jammed the lock of his cell door and hanged himself for three to five minutes before federal marshals reached through a cell window and cut him down, the Justice Department said today.

Department spokesman Tom DeCair said, "We believe he jammed the lock with a piece of cardboard Sunday afternoon." DeCair said Hinckley, who tried to hang himself with a rolled up fatigue jacket, was in the Fort Meade, Md. army post hospital Monday and had a breathing tube in his throat, which has prevented him from speaking.

"But he is responding to verbal and non-verbal stimuli," DeCair said. DeCair said earlier that marshals had seen him begin the suicide try at 4:55 p.m. Sunday.

The spokesman said Hinckley, 26, was semi-conscious and suffering from hypoxia, or oxygen deficiency, when he arrived at the hospital at the army base but was in satisfactory condition with "no serious injury of any kind."

Reagan invites union leaders

NEW YORK (AP) — President Ronald Reagan, conspicuously not invited to address an AFL-CIO convention this week, is trying to "reach out" to labor by inviting federation President Lane Kirkland and the group's policymakers to meet with him in the Oval Office.

Robert Bonitati, special assistant to the president for public liaison, said late Sunday the invitation was delivered over the weekend to Kirkland, in town for today's opening session of the convention. Bonitati declined to say whether there was any response from Kirkland, who has been bitterly critical of administration economic and labor policies.

Despite the White House initiative, Kirkland continued to talk tough about Reagan and his policies.

Court rules on child pornography

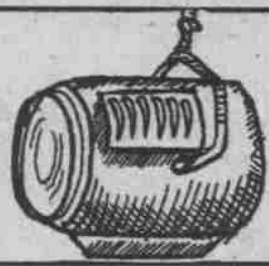
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court agreed Monday to decide how far states can go in outlawing the use of children in sexually explicit photographs, movies and plays.

The court will consider reinstating a New York law that was found to be an unconstitutional infringement on free-speech rights since it could ban even non-obscene performances by children.

Nineteen states have similar "kiddie pornography" laws. The court's study of what is viewed as a rapidly growing problem comes at a time when Congress also is being asked to help by providing more law-enforcement money to combat the sexual exploitation of children.
