

Lose to ECU 71-66

Heel women blow lead

East Carolina jumped out to a quick second half lead and withstood repeated North Carolina charges and 30 points from Tresa Brown to defeat the Tar Heels 71-66 in women's basketball action Tuesday night at Carmichael Auditorium.

Brown, the junior center from Raleigh, scored 22 first half points, hitting her first nine shots, as the Tar Heels lead at intermission 37-36. But a second half defensive move saw ECU coach Kathy Andruzzi put Loletha Harrison on Brown, holding her to eight points thereafter.

"We kept pushing and pushing and finally made the adjustment in the second half," Andruzzi said. "Brown is phenomenal," she said.

"The difference is that we statted hesitating to give Tresa the ball in the second half," UNC coach Jennifer Alley said. "Why? I don't know. We did so well at the start."

The Tar Heels opened up as much as a five point lead before halftime, thanks mainly to the play of Brown and the outside shooting of Ranti Killian, who finished with 9 points, eight before the break.

But the Pirates, led by forwards Mary Denkler and Sam Jones, scored the first six points in the second half and opened up a 42-37 lead. The Tar Heels regained the advantage at 46-44 with just under 14 minutes to play when Robyn Hadley converted a three-point play.

The score remained close, with both teams exchanging baskets, until ECU used inside scores by Jones and Denkler to open up a 56-52 lead with eight minutes left.

Carolina fought back to within two points at 54-52 on baskets by Brown and Meredith White. But after a missed free throw by White that could have cut the Pirate lead to one with just over two minutes remaining, Carolina failed to score again until just eight seconds remaining and the game decided.

Foul shots by Jones, Denkler and Fran Hooks, along with the tough ECU defense, iced the game for the Pirates in the last two minutes.

"Sam played clutch," Andruzzi said of Jones, who led ECU with 19 points. "They closed in on Mary (Denkler) and our people from the perimeter came through." Denkler followed with 13 points while both Lillian Barnes and Loraine Foster added 12.

"ECU played a super game," Alley said. "With only eight players, they had to be physical, hustle and scrap."

"Sam (Jones) took more control of the court in the second half," Alley said. "She did a good job."

The Tar Heels, who dropped to 7-6 for the season, played without guard Eileen McCann, out with an ankle sprain. After losing five players from last years squad, East Carolina now stands at 6-7.

In this only the second home game since December 5, the Tar Heels continued to be plagued by turnovers and inconsistent play. Carolina committed 11 errors in the first half alone. The same type errors hurt the Heels during Christmas break, where Carolina was 3-3 during various tournaments.

The Tar Heels travel to Raleigh this weekend for the Wolfpack Doubleheader, playing Pittsburgh on Friday night and Georgia State on Saturday night.

Holiday proves difficult for Tar Heel wrestlers

Don't ask the UNC wrestling team about their Christmas break.

After a convincing win at the Penn State Invitational, the wrestlers suffered losses to both No. 1 Oklahoma and No. 2 Iowa State and took sixth place in the Midlands Classic in what can only be called a fair vacation.

On Jan. 5, the fifth-ranked Tar Heels found themselves back in high school—South Mecklenburg High in Charlotte—to take on top-ranked Oklahoma.

After 118 Bob Monaghan and No. 1-ranked C.D. Mock at 134 moved Carolina out in front, the 7-1 Sooners roared back to score five consecutive victories in the middleweight classes and destroy any hope for a Tar Heel upset.

At 126, second-ranked Dave Cooke was upset by the Sooners' Clinton Burke 3-1, and Mock, still recovering from a ligament pull in his foot, came back from a 3-1 deficit to defeat No. 2 Derek Glenn with an escape, takedown and two back points in the third period.

"The matches weren't really as lopsided as it looks," said Coach Bill Lam. "Cooke lost in the last two seconds, Mock beat No. 2 and Monaghan did a great job."

Lam said the Tar Heels could compete with any team in the nation but that the higher weight classes were the team's weak point.

Against Iowa State Dec. 21 at Carmichael Auditorium, the team again took an early lead, 9-0, with an upset pin by fourth-ranked Monaghan over second-ranked Kevin Darkus, and a 6-5 decision by All-America Cooke.

But the lead was shattered by the Cyclones as they took every remaining

match en route to a 27-8 victory. The Tar Heels were cited one point for a bench technical foul. Mock, who pulled foot ligaments in the Penn State Invitational, and 142-pound Matt King both missed the Iowa State match.

"I knew on paper that both Oklahoma and Iowa State should beat us, but we stayed close with Oklahoma," Lam said. "We're disappointed in losing, but it helped by showing what we have got to work on; it didn't really hurt us by losing to the two top teams because we're still ranked fifth."

The Tar Heels traveled to Chicago Dec. 27-28 and finished sixth at the Midlands Classic, a tournament that should prove to be a preview of the NCAAs in March. It included national powers Iowa, Iowa State and Missouri.

Three Carolina matmen placed: 118 Monaghan took fifth place, and both 126 Cooke and 167 Jan Michaels finished fourth.

Back on Dec. 5, when most students were busy studying for finals, the Tar Heels crammed their third victory into the books at the Penn State Invitational.

Winners for Carolina included Cooke at 126 and Mock at 134, and 158-pound sophomore Bill Gaffney, while Monaghan advanced to the finals, losing 8-3 in the championship match. Jan Michaels finished fourth at 167 pounds and Carolina's Tim Plott took third at 150 pounds.

After the dual-meet losses to Oklahoma and Iowa State, Carolina roared back on Jan. 6 against Oswego State, winning 32-6. The team is now 1-2 on the year in dual meet competition.

The Tar Heels won eight of the ten matches against Oswego State, two on pins by Monaghan and Mock.

"Oswego is a respectable team, with a lot of those tough New York boys," Lam said. "We needed that win to let out some of the frustration from Oklahoma and ISU. After two matches like that, I didn't want them to get used to losing."

During ticket distribution today at 3 p.m., the Tar Heels square off against Hofstra University in Carmichael Auditorium.

Hofstra comes to Chapel Hill after losing to a tough Clemson team by only one match.

Fencers impressive in tourney

In preparation for this Saturday's meet against powerful Penn State, the UNC men's and women's fencing teams showed several good individual performances in last weekend's Wolfpack open tournament in Raleigh.

The competition was open to both amateur and collegiate fencers so no team scores were kept.

In the women's foil division, Karen Marnell took the top spot with Linda Butler placing sixth. John Friedburg won the men's sabre while John Hrdle and

Dave Porter placed first and second in the men's epee. In the men's foil, Bob Largman and Scott Cohen finished third and fourth respectively.

The men and women who both completed last season ranked 11th in the nation, face difficult schedules. The men face eight of last year's top 10 schools while the women will compete in the NCAA instead of the AIAW.

Tickets for the North/South doubleheader in Charlotte Feb. 5-6 will go on sale this Thursday at 8:30 a.m. The Tar Heels will face non-conference opponents Furman on the first night and The Citadel the following evening. Both games start at 9 p.m.

Tickets may only be bought for the entire doubleheader, at \$25 a book. No individual game tickets will be available,

but students may buy two books. Students should be aware of two changes for future distribution times.

The Clemson distribution this Saturday, Jan. 16 will take place at 2 p.m., not 9 a.m. The Tigers will visit Carmichael Jan. 27.

In addition, the NC State 9 a.m. ticket distribution for Saturday, Jan. 23 has been moved back to 2 p.m. that afternoon. The Tar Heels clash with the Wolfpack in Chapel Hill Jan. 30.

A game with the Georgia Bulldogs scheduled for the Greensboro Coliseum later in the season has been completely sold out.
