UNC sports highlights

The UNC women's swimming team won its second consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference championship this weekend, racking up 1148 points, while rival N.C. State came in second with 907 points.

In the men's competition, the Tar Heels finished second to the Wolfpack with 402 points.

Outstanding Carolina swimmers came from Sue Walsh, who set a national record in the 50-yard backstroke (25.865); the men's 400-yard medley relay, which broke the existing ACC record; and Eric Ericson, who swam on the medley relay and won the 100- and 200-yard backstrokes.

The UNC wrestling team failed to break N.C. State's stranglehold on the conference title, finishing second in what was basically a two-team ACC tournament in Carmichael Auditorium Sunday. State scored 97.5 points to UNC's 82.5, and Clemson was third with 53.

Dave Cooke, at 126 lbs., and C.D. Mock, at 134 lbs., were Carolina's only individual winners.

No. 3 seed Todd Sterr of Clemson upset No. 1 seed Bob Monaghan in overtime to win the 118-lb. class. In another close match, 167-lb. Jan Michaels was defeated 7-1 in overtime by Craig Cox of State. UNC's Mike Elinsky (150 lbs.) and Bill Gaffney (158 lbs.) finished second, while Robert Shriner (177 lbs.) and Steve Gibble (190 lbs.) were third.

Receiving wild-card bids to the NCAA tournament for Carolina were Elinsky, Gaffney, Michaels and Monaghan.

The UNC women's basketball team fell to Clemson for the second time in a week, losing 84-76 Saturday night in the ACC tournament semifinals at Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh.

Forward Henrietta Walls scored a career-high 30 points and center Tresa Brown added 19 for UNC.
