"We're not exactly in a league per se," said vice president Brian Cusak, a junior business major, "But we'd like to get one started."

"I've always been interested in Frisbee," he said. "I wanted to start playing competitively, and I jumped at the chance here.

"Ultimate is a growing sport," he said. "I truly believe it should be accommodated into intercollegiate com-

Marty pointed out a problem that many clubs have been facing: that of participation versus competition. "On one hand, it's for everyone,"

he said. "On the other hand, we have a problem when we go to compete; it's really tough to decide (who gets to play)."

Marty does feel that Frisbee can be

more than it is. "At State, they have a credit course

in Frisbee," he said. "We're trying to get an ultimate Frisbee league established." Marty encouraged people to come

to the Sunday afternoon practices whether they are novices or pros, men or women.

"It's a sport that lends itself to newcomers. And one-third of our membership is women."

The club practices each Sunday at noon on Ehringhaus field.

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

The baseball team battled back from a two-run deficit to take the lead against conference foe Wake Forest Wednesday, but UNC could not hold on and lost 7-6 when Wake scored with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning.

UNC entered the final inning trailing 5-3. Deacon pitcher Frank Warner walked Stuart Jump and Greg Schuler, and Barney Spooner reached first on an error to load the bases. After Chris Pittaro struck out, Pete Kumiega grounded into a fielder's choice.

Jump and Schuler scored when Wake second baseman Kevin Bunn erred on the double play attempt. Kumiega scored when Wake's first baseman dropped Todd Wilkinson's pop fly, and UNC went into the second half of the inning with a 6-5 lead.

Bunn hit a home run off pitcher Tom Reed to tie the game. Reliever Ron Huffman struck out Brian Greif before Colin Meagher reached first on an error and Nick Chmil singled. Designated hitter David Couch grounded out to Kumiega for the second out. But Pittaro bobbled Tom Gregg's bouncer, scoring Meagher. John Marshall and Spooner both hit

home runs for UNC.

The UNC women's tennis team won its second match in as many days Wednesday by blasting Harvard 8-1 in Chapel

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







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
