# Student reactions to President's speech varied

UNC students tuned in with the rest of the nation Monday night when President Reagan appeared on television to discuss last week's downing of a Korean airliner. And like others nationwide, UNC students Tuesday had plenty to say about the incident and Reagan's speech.

Although there have been no organized demonstrations in Chapel Hill, residents seemed angry over the incident.

Alan Rundo, a senior from High Point, said that although he agreed with some of what the president had to say in his television address, he was appalled at how Reagan used the speech to push other unrelated policies.

"I think that the idea of a technology ban like he suggested was a pretty good idea," he said. "But I think that the worst thing about it is that in his speech last night, Reagan connected this to Czechoslovakia, Hungary, the Afghanistan invasion, and even brought up Sen. Jackson (of Washington state, who died Thursday) and his support of the MX missile.

"He used this occasion to get support for his own MX missile plan," Rundo said. "Actually, shooting down this plane has nothing to do with Reagan's MX missile program and it's an insult to the families of the deceased to use it in this manner."

J.P. Kim, a political science graduate student and a native of South Korea, said that it would be "nearly impossible" for the United States to impose strict economic sanctions against the Soviets. adding that such sanctions could be more harmful to the United States than the

Soviet Union. He also had his own theory about why the plane was shot down.

"I think that shooting down the plane is one thing, but it's another thing that they chose intentionally a Korean plane because they (the Koreans) are so close to the U.S. and the Reagan administration," Kim said.

A Chapel Hill resident and native of the Soviet Union who asked not to be identified attributed the attack to the "Soviet paranoia of spies." The Chapel Hill resident said that the Russian government will cover up any bad light shed onto it by "intensifying propaganda to almost enormous proportions, propaganda that accuses Reagan for the deaths of innocent citizens." The Soviet native said that one propaganda tactic used by the official Soviet news agency is to turn around quotes of American officials.

John DeSalva, a freshman from Chap-

pus.

paqua, N.Y., said that the incident will always be remembered by the American public but that it will not have a lasting effect on Soviet-American relations. DeSalva also had some suggestions for sanctions against the Soviet Union.

"For one year, we should refuse landing rights any place to Aeroflot (the Soviet airline) and try to get our allies to do the same," he said. "Politically, the president doesn't have many options open to him. Maybe trade sanctions in conjunction with our allies, but our allies are hard to coordinate against the Soviet Union."

James Eldridge, a first-year law student from Hendersonville, says that his "gut reaction" is to take action, but not to endanger human lives.

"For example, if any fishing trawlers violate the zone, we should go ahead and seize them just to show that we can do something similar," he said.

DETROIT - A United Auto Workers council Tuesday overwhelmingly endorsed a two-year, \$1 billion contract that would put Chrysler Corp. workers a big step closer to parity with their counterparts at General Motors Corp. and Ford Motor Corp.

The new accord, tentatively agreed to by union negotiators and the automaker on Labor Day, would give Chrysler workers a \$2.42-an-hour raise over the life of the contract, the UAW said. That would put their base hourly pay, exclusive of regularly scheduled cost-of-living raises, at about \$12.42 when the pact expires in October 1985.

Chrysler workers - who fell behind GM and Ford workers when they granted concessions to help keep their company from bankruptcy - get \$1 of the raise immediately, retroactive to Aug. 15, with the rest in installments in 1984 and 1985.

GM and Ford workers could be making at least the same \$12.42 when their contract expires in September 1984, but any improvements the UAW might negotiate then would put those workers back ahead of Chrysler's.

GENEVA, Switzerland - A subcommittee of the U.N. Human Rights Commission has called on Iran to stop using child soldiers in its war with Iraq.

A resolution adopted Monday also called on international organizations to offer all possible aid for the welfare of children being held as prisoners by Iraq, or to assist those children who desire to settle in another Islamic country "until such time as their return to the Islamic Republic of Iran becomes feasible."

Humanitarian groups claim that thousands of children between the ages of 12 and 18 are fighting in the Iraq-Iran war and that Iran refuses to accept the return of nearly 250 held as prisoners of war in Iraq.

New Jersey. By this time last year, there were 48 NEA-sponsored strikes in seven states.

"We don't think we'll equal last year's total of 125 strikes," said Howard Carroll, an NEA spokesman. Meanwhile, three locals of the 580,000-member rival teacher union, the American Federation of Teachers, are on strike so far this week - in Pawtucket, R.I., East Detroit, and a Hebrew day school in Detroit called the Akiva School. At this time last year, seven AFT locals were on strike, and there were 11 strikes during the year. But few major cities have had teacher strikes so far.

Vacancy signs blinked back to life at North Carolina resorts as vacationers headed home to end a Labor Day weekend sprinkled with politics and labor celebrations.

More than 1,200 workers at the N.C. State Fairgrounds in Raleigh heard Crystal Lee Sutton, whose life was made famous in the movie Norma Rae, urge laborers to join unions and become more politically active. Sutton worked 10 years ago to organize a union at the J.P. Stevens Co. plant in Roanoke Rapids.

"I'm tired of seeing the poor getting poorer and the rich getting richer," Sutton told the crowd at a rally sponsored by the state AFL-CIO. "Let's do something about it. Let's get out there and vote."

Ken Blaylock, international president of the American Federation of ·Government Employees and the rally's keynote speaker, said the Reagan administration was no friend of workers.

By the fall of 1985 the UNC campus should have a new \$6.8 million residence hall to house about 500 students in air-conditioned comfort.

Trees are starting to fall on Stadium Drive between Fetzer Gym and Teague dormitory in preparation for the six-story facility.

UNC Planning Director Gordon Rutherford said the new dorm will be a part of the Residence Hall Association and will pay for itself. "The University will borrow money, build it with interim financing and retire the debt with dorm rents," he said.

Rutherford said Security Building Co., the same company that built the Carolina Union addition, will be working on an ambitious 22-month schedule.

The building will be set back from Stadium Drive to save as many trees as possible. But the construction does not include parking spaces, Rutherford said. Ben Callahan, assistant director of traffic and security, said his office is not requiring that any new parking space

be built for the new dorm. "We're not pushing for any new parking, because it is

just a fact that there is no space for new parking," he said. Callahan added that with the completion of the Student Activities Center and a possible rearrangement of parking spaces, the new dormitory would not pose any major parking problems.

Having commuters park further away from campus might be a possibility, Callahan said. Stadium Drive parking now is about 75 percent commuters, he said.

Who is going to live in the dormitory is another question that is up in the air.

Wayne Kuncl, director of University housing, said that since taking office this summer he has realized there is a need for more all-women's housing.

Graves, associate dean of the General College. The candidate is then reviewed by the College of Arts and Sciences, by the Faculty Advisory Committee and by the Board of Trustees.

In the division of Academic Affairs, there are 662 tenured faculty members and 249 nontenured faculty members. Data compiled by Elizabeth Fisher, research assistant in the Office of Institutional Research, shows that about 20 people per year have received tenure for the past

three years. Data on the number of those applying for tenure was not available.

Ferrell said that he agreed that the tenure system did allow some teachers to be lazy, but that doing away with tenure would not solve the problem. Tenure is not a detriment to teaching, he said, although a faculty member who submitted grades and reports on time, did an adequate amount of research, followed the course guideline and "didn't rock the boat" could be successful in the tenure system.

Ferrell said that it might be possible for a professor to lose tenure if his rank is reduced, but "any grounds which would be sufficient to warrant diminishment of rank would be sufficient to warrant dismissal altogether."
