

# Block seating distribution changes

When assignments were given for block football tickets Monday, they were decided differently than they were last week.

The group that was drawn first received the best block seats assignment. Block seats were randomly distributed for last week's Memphis State game.

Carolina Athletic Association President Padraic Baxter said there were some problems with the last block ticket distribution.

"We're new at it," Baxter said. "When you have a hundred block sections, it is hard to decide where to put everybody." Baxter said the problems would be solved for the Miami of Ohio distribution today.

Block tickets can only be picked up on Tuesdays. Some students came in last Wednesday with tickets to pick up block seats and were disappointed, said Judson Pope, a UNC ticket usher.

Tokens are given to the groups instead of having each group make its own tokens, as was the policy last year.

Last year, several students charged in letters to *The Daily Tar Heel*, that block ticket lotteries were unfair. This year the policy has been changed so that groups that are not chosen one week are given two chances in the lottery the following week.

This year, there are also changes in the individual ticket distribution. Tickets are distributed randomly instead of first-come, first-serve. The purpose of the new individual ticket distribution policy is to keep people from missing classes, said John Cherry, UNC Director of Ticket Operations.

Distribution also was changed in hopes of shorter lines and student safety, said Lisa Zinn, CAA chairman of ticket distribution. A few students were hurt last fall when there was a rush for the door before tickets for the North Carolina

State University game were passed out.

"I think the State game last year really threw a scare into some people," she said.

Mary Sheryl Horine, a junior from Boone, said she liked the new system.

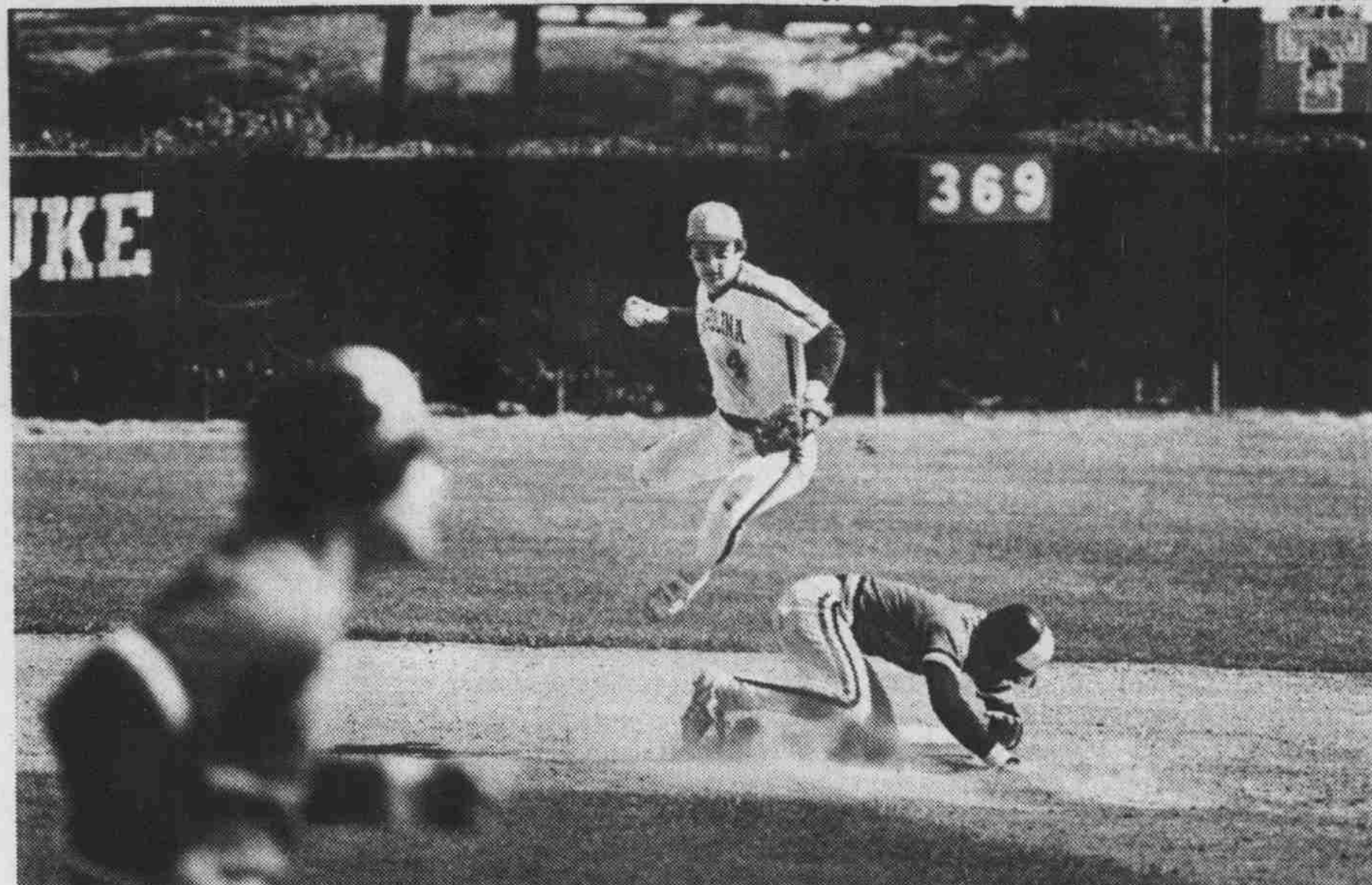
"I didn't have to wait and miss class just to pick up football tickets," Horine said.

Barbara Dancy, a UNC ticket usher, suggested that students pick up tickets on the half-hour. The busiest time is right on the hour — especially at 11 a.m., 12 p.m. and 1 p.m., she said.

"Come on the half-hour and sometimes there isn't a line at all," Dancy said.

The new distribution system is easier on ushers too. "This works out a lot better for me," Pope said. "Last year I had to be here at 6 a.m."

Terry Kellagher, a senior from Long Beach, said: "Even though my tickets are lousy, it's better than seeing people doing nothing while waiting in line. We'll see if it pays off."

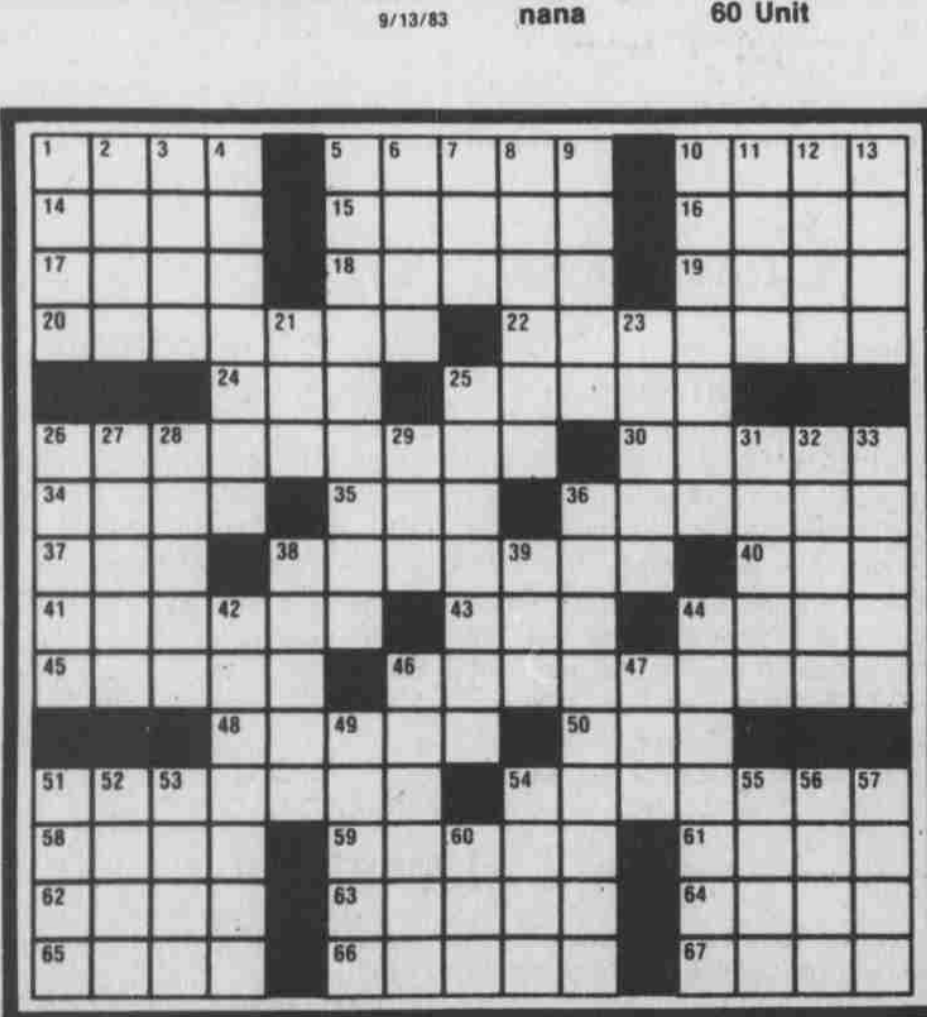
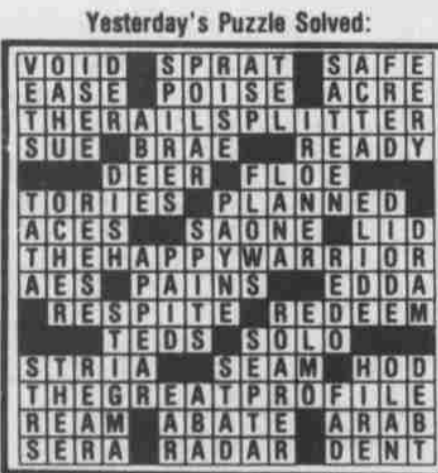
