

Estes Dr. extension plan may be abandoned

Disagreement between the towns of Chapel Hill and Carrboro over the proposed thoroughfare plan may come to an end tonight at a special Carrboro Board of Aldermen meeting, said Edison Johnson, and engineer for the state Department of Transportation.

The board will hear public discussion on the matter and possibly could vote to accept a plan that has already been approved by the Chapel Hill Town Council, Johnson said. He said he thought the board would be prepared to drop a part of Carrboro's plan that has been

the central point of disagreement between the two towns.

The board wants to include in the plan an extension of Estes Drive to the east side of Chapel Hill. The extension is excluded from Chapel Hill's version of the plan.

The plan which would increase mobility on U.S. 15-501 Bypass and decrease traffic in downtown Chapel Hill, has been under consideration since 1978. Johnson said the aldermen may accept Chapel Hill's version of the plan just to end the long dispute. "I don't think it's going to be adequate," he said. "But I don't think we're ever going to get Chapel Hill to change their minds."

Carrboro Mayor Jim Parto agreed and said he believed most of the board members did not think Chapel Hill

would revise its plan.

Although he may give his support to the plan at the meeting tonight, Parto said he still thought it was insufficient and would want it reviewed annually.

"Chapel Hill is going to have to realize that we need some sort of access to that area (proposed I-40 and the 15-501 bypass), whether it be Estes Drive or through some other facility," he said.

Johnson said he also thought the board would approve the plan so that it could be sent to the DOT for approval in February. If the two towns do not reach an agreement, it is unlikely that the DOT board will consider the plan, he said.

Reagan plans active though unopposed GOP campaign

WASHINGTON — President Reagan is planning an active campaign outside the Rose Garden this spring, although he faces no opposition for his party's presidential nomination, and he said Monday he favors a debate with his Democratic opponent.

Reagan, who will battle for many of the same labor votes that helped him win the 1980 election, argued that his tax cut

program benefited a wider range of Americans than did an extensive tax reduction offered by President John F. Kennedy 22 years ago.

"Our tax program was fair," said Reagan. "It was fair across the board."

With Sunday's formal announcement of his candidacy behind him, Reagan began a busy schedule that will have him making several trips out of Washington each month as well as speeches in the capital.

On Monday, the audience was the national religious broadcasters' convention. Today, he will fly to Chicago for a 10-minute speech to a convention of the sand and gravel industry.

He strode to the Oval Office at 8:58 a.m. EST, nine hours after declaring he would seek a second term. The White House staff took the highly unusual step of inviting reporters and photographers to the Rose Garden to witness his return to work as a candidate.

Reagan ducked an opportunity to answer a question about whether he would win the election, saying: "You know me. I never say anything like that. Too superstitious."

Asked whether he would debate his Democratic opponent, when nominated,

Reagan replied: "In principle, I support debates. I favor that idea." But he said it was too early to make specific plans.

Edward J. Rollins, director of the Reagan campaign organization, did not share the president's reluctance to predict victory in November.

"Today if the election were held, it would be far more of a rout than it was in 1980," Rollins said. Reagan won 51 percent of the popular vote but had 49 electoral votes to Jimmy Carter's 49 in that election.

Rollins said Reagan's longtime political advisers "could not find four states in the country in which we are trailing." He said an election now would show Reagan winning 45 or 46 states with 55 or 57 percent of the vote.

WASHINGTON — U.S. negotiator Edward Rowley said Monday the United States would consider any serious Soviet proposals, including curbs on new U.S. nuclear missiles in Europe, in an effort to work out a strategic arms control agreement.

After a half-hour meeting with President Reagan, Rowley said he had several U.S. approaches or "trade-offs" to present if the Soviets agreed to resume discussions in Geneva, Switzerland.

"It's in their interest to come back," Rowley said. "We are now in a position, when we return to the table, to make a breakthrough."

Negotiations to curb medium-range missiles in Europe and separate talks on controlling intercontinental nuclear weapons are stalemated. The Soviets disrupted both discussions to protest installation of U.S. Pershing 2 missiles in West Germany and cruise missiles in Great Britain.

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. said Monday that President Reagan is trying to "pass the buck" on record red ink by pressing for bipartisan talks on trimming \$100 billion from federal budget deficits.

O'Neill's remarks were another indication of how little progress has been made since last Wednesday when Reagan issued his election-year invitation for a bipartisan congressional delegation to discuss deficit reduction measures with White House officials.

So far, distrust by Democrats who fear a political trap, and confusion over what items the president is willing to negotiate on, has resulted in rhetoric rather than substance. No

meetings are expected until after the president sends his fiscal 1985 budget to Congress on Wednesday.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said Monday that the administration was "prepared to sit down and negotiate" and he insisted the president's offer was "no ploy."

WINSTON-SALEM — An FBI expert testified Monday that Ku Klux Klansman Mark Sherer fired the first shot in a 39-shot gun battle at a 1979 Greensboro rally that left five communist protesters dead.

Last week, Sherer asked to change his plea of guilty and void a plea bargain with the government in which he was to testify against nine other Klansmen and Nazis.

In painstaking detail, Bruce Koenig described for a federal jury his theories on where the shots originated, and said his theories had changed since he testified for the defense in the 1980 state murder trial for six Klansmen and Nazis.

The Klansmen and Nazis are currently on trial in federal court for civil rights violations arising from the No. 3, 1979, confrontation.

Orange County had the state's lowest December unemployment rate at 2.8 percent, the State Employment Security Commission reported Monday. The Orange County rate was down from 3.5 percent in November.

"The individual county percentages reflect the significant drop of half of one percentage point to 7.3 percent, down from 7.8 percent in November 1983," said ESC chairman Glenn Jer-nigan. "Nonmanufacturing contributed most to the decrease with employment up by 6,300 jobs in the trade sector."

The state's 10 metropolitan statistical areas reported lower jobless rates in December than in November. Raleigh-Durham led the metropolitan areas with 3.8 percent unemployment, down from 4.4 percent.
