

WASHINGTON — Lawmakers are predicting Congress will approve emergency military aid for El Salvador, even though House leaders said today the measure is being held up by a fight over undercover money for Nicaraguan guerrillas.

Despite the hold-up, Salvadoran President-elect Jose Napoleon Duarte's dramatic 10-hour visit to Capitol Hill Tuesday left both supporters and opponents of military aid saying the funds would be approved.

"Duarte will get his money," Sen. Paul Tsongas, D-Mass., said after he and other Senate opponents of the Reagan administration's Central American policies met with Duarte late Tuesday. "This is a personal triumph, his visit up here. There is no doubt that he went away from here with a lot of friends."

SPACE CENTER, Houston — The

first commercial engineer named to a U.S. space flight said Tuesday that a drug he will produce in space next month will be a "breakthrough in medical treatment" that could benefit tens of millions of people.

Charles Walker would not identify the drug, saying only it is a hormone to correct a certain body deficiency.

MOSCOW — Semyon Romanov, 62, chief of the general staff of the Air Defense Corps when that unit's pilots shot down the Korean Airlines Boeing 747 over Sakhalin Island on Sept. 1, "died suddenly in the line of duty," the armed forces newspaper reported Tuesday.

Romanov's last assignment was as representative of the Soviet commander-in-chief of Warsaw Pact armed forces, attached to the East German army.

AROUND CAMPUS

The Health Sciences Library has been placed seventh overall on a list of "largest and most active" libraries of its type by the editor of *Annual Statistics of Medical School Libraries in the United States and Canada*, based on a composite of elements that project an overall comparison. In a statistical profile of 134 libraries for 1982-83, UNCH ranked in the top 25 in 11 different categories.

Four UNC students were awarded Mellon Fellowships for graduate studies in the humanities, making the University here one of only nine schools in the nation to produce four or more Mellon award winners.

The awards may be worth up to \$18,000 for a year of study. UNC recipients are Seth Matthew Holtzman and Seth Robert Katz of Raleigh; Jean Carol MacDonald of Miami, Fla.; and Douglas Mills McPherson of Howell, Michigan.

The Mellon fellowships are awarded

by the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation and funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. The awards are given to prepare outstanding students for careers as scholars and teachers in the humanistic disciplines.

Dr. Janet J. Fischer and Dr. Newton D. Fischer have become the first husband and wife to receive UNC's Thomas Jefferson Award.

The Fischers have been faculty members in the School of Medicine for more than 30 years. The award is given annually to members of the University community who best exemplify the ideals and objectives of Thomas Jefferson through writing, teaching and scholarship.

Six faculty members at UNC were presented awards for teaching excellence by Chancellor Christopher C.

Fordham III at a recent Faculty Council meeting.

Dr. Garry M. Armstrong, associate professor of business administration, received the Nicholas Salgo Distinguished Teaching Award for "teaching excellence as evidenced by classroom effectiveness and ability to motivate and inspire students."

Five faculty members received Tanner awards for excellence in teaching, especially at the freshman and sophomore levels. They are: Dr. John B. Adams, professor of journalism; Dr. George S. Lensing, associate professor and assistant chairman of English; Dr. Ancel C. Mewborn, professor of mathematics; Dr. Marylyn A. Scott, assistant professor of German; and Dr. Lawrence G. Rowan, associate professor of physics.

"The winners of these teaching awards are inspiring to those of us working in administration," Fordham said. "They epitomize high aspirations and demonstrated excellence."
