

Candidates woo voters on Labor Day

Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Martin accused Democratic opponent Rufus Edmisten of making promises he couldn't keep Monday while Gov. Jim Hunt criticized Republican Sen. Jesse Helms' ideas for reducing the federal deficit.

Candidates braved the sun in the last days of summer to heat up political charges as the campaign season moved nearer the end.

Martin, 9th District congressman, held news conferences in Asheville, Greensboro, Raleigh, Wilmington and Charlotte to attack Edmisten for playing the "politics of illusion."

"He (Edmisten) is a regional candidate and he's attempting to pit region against region in our state," Martin said in Raleigh. "Rufus proposes to conquer

by division, by coming from all directions at once."

Martin cited as an example accounts of Edmisten speeches across the state, in which he promised to make various highways a priority if elected governor.

Edmisten said he could not promise to change the state priorities in road building in a Raleigh speech but then told a Hickory audience that he would make road building and maintenance in the west a priority because the east had been favored financially in the past with its larger population.

Edmisten also listed at least six highway projects he would make a priority in his administration.

"There just is not enough money to make all those promises come true," Martin said. "Road politics has been the politics of illusion for many years ... People realize they've been taken one time too many."

Edmisten visited an annual union celebration Monday in Kernersville and could not be reached for comment but campaign director Richard Carlton attributed Martin's comments to jealousy.

"I suspect Mr. Martin is kind of envious because Rufus is such a statewide candidate," Carlton said. "He (Martin) is a candidate who's only represented the Charlotte area. I suspect everywhere Martin is going he's hearing good things about Rufus."

Carlton said that Edmisten has not guaranteed favors on highway projects to any region.

Martin said he's appointing a "truth squad" of volunteers to follow Edmisten to "correct his misleading statements by holding news conferences or issuing statements in order to present the true facts."

Meanwhile, Hunt held a news conference to attack Helms' approach to balancing the federal budget. He charged that Helms has worked to give tax breaks to big oil companies and the wealthy, to cut spending for education and the elderly and to continue spending on military contracts that involve waste.

"One way you can get the deficit down is by rooting waste and inefficiency out of those huge military contracts, but that's about the only thing Sen. Helms doesn't want to cut," Hunt charged.

Helms spent the day resting at home with his family Raleigh. He was not immediately available for comment.

Soviet officials:Chernenko is 'occupied'

MOSCOW — A Soviet Foreign Ministry official declined to answer specifically Monday when asked if President Konstantin U. Chernenko was back at work in the Kremlin, but said Chernenko was "occupied" with his leadership duties.

The official, Vladimir Lomeiko, was asked about Chernenko by an American journalist at a news briefing on disarmament issues.

The reporter asked if it could be concluded, because of Chernenko's replies to questions about U.S.-Soviet relations in the Communist Party newspaper *Pravda* on Sunday, that Chernenko had ended his summer vacation and was back at work in the Kremlin.

"He is occupied with his duties as general secretary of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and as chairman of the Presidium of the U.S.S.R.," Lomeiko said. Lomeiko used a Russian word meaning occupied, or engaged in.

A Soviet translator at the briefing translated the word into English as "carrying out."

There have been unconfirmed reports that Chernenko, who suffers from respiratory problems, cut short his vacation in early August and returned to Moscow for hospitalization.

News in Brief

Teachers strike

Nearly 5,000 public school teachers spent Labor Day on strike in seven states, with some of them scheduled to vote on proposed new contracts and more strikes predicted elsewhere as the school year opens.

A total of 83,331 students are enrolled in the districts where 4,649 teachers are on strike.

The state hardest hit was Illinois, where 3,274 teachers are on strike in eight districts, affecting about 57,000 students. Most of the walkouts began early last week.

In Chicago, the Chicago Teachers' Union House of Delegates voted Monday to continue working under their recently expired contract until Nov. 1 while mediation continues.

Private-public tuition gap cited

The tuition gap between public and private colleges is already great and will continue to grow, threatening the existence of some private colleges, some state education officials say.

The cost difference between attending the private colleges and the public

universities is so great that it is threatening the economic and, consequently, the educational health of the independent institutions, said Elon College President Fred Young.

"We cannot remain healthy without reducing the financial disparities," he said.

In 1973, the state paid \$1,867 for each North Carolina undergraduate enrolled in a public university and \$200 for each private college student for a difference of \$1,667. The difference jumped to \$3,045 in 1983.

Black out order refused

BRIGHTON, England — Power and electrical workers refused Monday to black out Britain, splitting the nation's giant Trades Union Congress over support for a six-month coal strike.

Moderate union leaders were booed and shouted down during a stormy debate before the 1,100 delegates at the labor federation's annual congress voted in an overwhelming show of hands not to take fuel supplies across the miners' picket lines.

Power station workers and steelworkers, however, said they would defy the fuel boycott and the rest of the TUC, whose 10 million members are half Britain's work force.
