Police restrict parking for football Saturdays

New parking restrictions have been initiated to reduce pedestrian and vehicular traffic on Saturdays when UNC has a home football game.

Parking will not be permitted on the sidewalk areas of S. Columbia Street from Franklin Street to Cameron Avenue, police said.

"Our greatest concern is pedestrian safety," said Major Arnold Gold of the Chapel Hill Police Department. "It is a highly congested area with many people gathering around vehicles."

Gold said there have not been any serious accidents in the area but "We try not to react but plan ahead. We will continue to expand on the

current policy in future years. Right now we just don't have enough people to enforce such laws."

The department has not created any alternative parking areas for those attending football games.

"People should take advantage of the park and ride town shuttle service to get to and from the games," Gold said.

The park and ride shuttle provides transportation to Kenan Stadium from Glen Lennox and Airport Road.

Legislators to study waste laws

A group of North Carolina legislators has been appointed to study regulations designed to make the state safer from dangers posed by hazardous wastes.

The five House and five Senate members will make recommendations to the General Assembly concerning strict liability for damages caused by hazardous wastes, according to House Speaker Liston B. Ramsey.

Included on the commission is Rep. Joe Hackney, D-Orange, a Chapel Hill attorney. The study was prompted by the defeat of a bill introduced to the General Assembly by Hackney and Rep. William Clark, D-Cumberland.

The strict liability bill, which passed the House but was defeated in the Senate, would make people generating, transporting, disposing of, or otherwise in control of hazardous wastes, accountable for injuries resulting from accidents involving those materials, said Ramsey.

negligence in handling the wastes must be established before victims can receive compensation for their injuries.

"It is difficult to prove what a big chemical company should or should not have done," Ramsey said. "This law would just make them responsible anyway." He said current laws make it too easy for those handling hazardous wastes to avoid being held legally respnsible for injuries citizens suffer from the wastes.

"Industries that transport and handle hazardous wastes are not in support of the bill," Ramsey said. He said such businesses claimed the legislation would increase their operating costs.

He attributed the defeat of the bill to lobbying pressure from businesses involved with hazardous wastes. "Business interests were able to stop it (the bill) in the Senate," he said. "They tried, but failed in the House."

Orange County voter registration for the Nov. 6 elections will take place until Oct. 8 at sites both on and off campus. All students age 18 and over who currently reside in Orange County and have been residents for at least 30 days prior to the election are eligible to register.

"Generally, we've been letting students register as long as they have proof of local address, because they will have been living here for 30 days by the date of the election," said Jane Atwater, Orange County Board of Election voter registrar.

At the time of registration, citizens must show identification and some document on which their current address is printed, such as a check, bill or receipt.

Orange County Board of Election officials will be holding a registration

drive at University Mall every Saturday this month, Oct. 6 and 7, from noon until 4 p.m.

Registrars will be present at Festifall in Chapel Hill on Oct. 7 until 6 p.m. in the old Post Office on Franklin Street.

In addition, campus registration will take place in the Student Union Auditorium on the following dates: Sept. 25, 9 a.m. until 2 p.m.; Sept. 26 from 3 until 9 p.m.; Sept. 27 from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Students who are currently registered in another county or state may transfer their registration at the same time they register in Orange County by filling out an information card.

Absentee ballots are currently available and are due Nov. 1 at 5 p.m. They may be picked up at either the Chapel Hill Municipal Building or at the Orange County Board of Election office in Hillsborough.
