

JT to sing for Hunt

James Taylor will give a benefit for Gov. Jim Hunt at 8 p.m. Sept. 28 at N.C. State University, Hunt campaign officials said yesterday.

"Anyone can attend the concert, but those who love James Taylor and dislike Gov. Hunt will have a hard choice to make," said Judy Hyman, special events coordinator for the Hunt campaign.

Tickets go on sale 10 a.m. Monday for \$13 and \$14 apiece at Schoolkid's Records locations in Chapel Hill, Raleigh and Cary, Schoolkid's owner Peter Boston said.

Alice Welch, co-chairman of the Hunt campaign in Orange County, said tickets could also be bought for \$50 apiece in a separate fundraising event she is coordinating. For extra money, ticket holders will get "prime seats" and an invitation to a recep-

tion after the concert at the N.C. State Faculty Club. Hunt and Taylor will attend the reception, she said.

While the number of tickets available is not known, Welch said, "We hope to fill Reynolds and raise lots of money for the governor." Reynolds Coliseum seats approximately 12,400.

According to Hyman, Taylor had wanted to stage a fundraiser for Hunt, but a busy professional schedule had kept the show tentative.

UNC's Carmichael Auditorium and Duke University's Cameron Indoor Stadium had been tapped as possible sites for a Taylor concert, but arrangements could not be made, she said.

"We are excited about getting folks who love James from Orange, Wake and Durham County," Hyman said.

CGC changes requirement

The Campus Governing Council overrode Student Body President Paul Parker's veto last night and passed a CGC bylaw changing the majority required to increase student fees by student referendum.

The CGC once again approved an act that would require only a simple majority of student votes to pass an increase in the Student Activities Fee. Until now, two-thirds majority of 20 percent of the student body was required for passage.

Parker proposed to eliminate both the two-thirds majority requirement as well as the stipulation that 20 percent of eligible student voters must participate in the referendum.

Without that additional change, Parker said, "I felt the law isn't being changed at all."

Student Affairs Committee Chairman Marshall Mills withdrew a bill

sponsoring a voter registration incentive drive among residence areas. Earlier in the day, the Finance Committee voted to appropriate only \$100 toward printing and publicity. Mills' committee had requested an additional \$500 for the prize.

During the meeting members debated for more than a half-hour the approval of the 1984-85 Undergraduate Attorney General Staff only to discover the appointees did not require CGC approval.

Doug Berger (Dist. 1), Ron Everett (Dist. 13) and Max Lloyd (Dist. 15) said they opposed approval because the 32 appointees included nine members from two fraternities, Tau Epsilon Phi and Beta Theta Pi.

"I felt that it was sort of an underhanded way to introduce it to the CGC; they left it up to us to spot," Berger said. "If there is a patronage system, it needs to be stopped."

Honor Court Chairman Sarah Raper and other CGC members argued the chosen staff members were highly qualified. Raper said fraternity members living together naturally would become interested in some of the same organizations.

Edwin Fountain, a junior Russian studies major from Arlington, Va., was approved as the new Elections Board chairman, and Charlotte sophomore Sonja Gantt was appointed to the Carolina Union Board of Directors. The CGC also authorized the student body treasurer to liquidate its stocks and place the funds in the general surplus.

Ferraro funds examined

WASHINGTON — The House ethics committee voted unanimously yesterday to investigate whether Rep. Geraldine A. Ferraro violated financial disclosure requirements of the Ethics in Government Act.

The investigation was triggered by allegations by the conservative Washington Legal Foundation that vice presidential candidate Ferraro's congressional financial disclosure statements violated the law.

"The ethics committee makes no judgment of any kind as to the validity of the allegations," the panel's chairman, Rep. Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, said after a 90-minute closed meeting.

"This committee will now conduct a preliminary inquiry... to ascertain the merit of the allegations," said Stokes, who characterized the probe as "analogous to a grand jury investigation."

He said Ferraro was being informed immediately of the action and would, under House rules, have the opportunity to respond either orally or in writing.

Nude photos taken, publisher says

NEW YORK — Penthouse magazine publisher Bob Guccione today claims he has 350 color slides of one of this year's Miss America contestants posing in the nude and will publish them if she wins.

Miss America 1984 Vanessa Williams, stepped down when nude photographs of her and another woman appeared in the September issue of Penthouse. Guccione says he intends to publish more pictures of Williams in coming issues.

Guccione said the pictures of the contestant in this year's pageant "were taken about 18 months ago. I'll publish them if she wins the title on Saturday."

Pageant promoters have said that despite the controversy over Williams, they have not insisted that contestants in this year's pageant sign any pledge that they have never posed nude.

Scientists hope instruments survive hurricane

RALEIGH — A million dollars worth of scientific instruments moored in Pamlico Sound may provide valuable new oceanographic data if they survive the onslaught of Hurricane Diana, an N.C. State University researcher says.

"We'll have a landmark, one-of-a-kind classic data set or no equipment," said Leonard J. Pietrafesa, professor of marine, earth and atmospheric sciences.

Instruments in the sound record the speed and direction of water motion, temperature, salt concentration and water pressure at various depths and are designed to help state officials determine when residents should be evacuated if disaster approaches and why shellfish and fishing industries in the area have been declining.

Helms delays genocide treaty

WASHINGTON — Sen. Jesse Helms today blocked a Senate Foreign Relations Committee vote on the long-delayed genocide treaty, but the panel's chairman, Sen. Charles H. Percy, R-Ill., said he would try again today.

The Reagan administration said it hopes for ratification by the full Senate before its scheduled adjournment Oct. 4.
