Despite double-figure loss, Tar Heels happy with performance against LSU

After being asked for the hundredth time by the sporting press a variation on the insightful question "Do you think LSU has a good team?", Kevin Anthony limped toward the showers, grimacing in pain.

Anthony played all of Saturday's game with a severe ankle sprain, yet set all-time UNC records for completions (31), attempts (53), and yardage (302). His was only one of the more visible of a collection of gritty performances displayed by North Carolina, a team that was not so much outplayed as out-talented Saturday in a 23-13 loss to Louisiana State.

The Tar Heels made comparatively few mistakes in the game. They only had one turnover, Anthony's 53rd pass of the game which turned into a meaningless interception. They capitalized on LSU miscues early, and generally played tough on defense. Eric Streater said last Tuesday that the offense would only need to score 20 points to win. That prediction was much closer than anyone who heard it would have imagined.

LSU entered the season with an offensive arsenal that sounded like it would rack up points every time it touched the ball, if you read some publications. But the Tar Heels were somewhat effective in holding LSU in check except for Dalton Hilliard, who sliced and darted for 142 yards and was labeled by defensive end Ron Burton as "much better than Napoleon McCallum."

By all accounts UNC played better in its loss than in the Navy win. For three quarters the Tar Heels played the No. 10team in the country evenly. It took two field goal attempts to finally turn the game the Tigers' way - a 54-yard LSU school record by Ron Lewis to give LSU a 16-13 lead and a fake field goal attempt that almost resulted in a touchdown for UNC.

Instead, in undeniably the most important play of the contest, Wes Sweetser stood up from his holder's position late in the fourth quarter with LSU ahead 23-13 and overthrew Damon Hueston at the goal line. As the ball fell harmlessly to the turf, so did UNC's chances for a major upset, one that would have catapulted them into the public eye and possibly into the Top 20 as well.

. But the game wasn't a total loss, for it should be referred to as the one that restored respect to Tar Heel football. UNC won't be able to sneak up on an unprepared Florida State or Maryland later in the year, because the team officially served notice Saturday that they can play with most anyone. If they were lightly regarded by LSU, no one else will make

the same mistake. "In the back of all our minds was the thought that if we beat these guys we'd get back a lot of the respect we lost in the past," said Earl Winfield, who caught 11 passes for 133 yards and juked an untold number of defensive backs. "We tried to earn LSU's respect, and I think we did,"

Coach Dick Crum seemed as pleased as he ever has been about a 10-point loss. "The thing I liked about it was even when we got behind we kept playing hard and hung in there," he said. "I've seen a couple of outfits here in the past, they get behind and cave in on you. But we played them down

Player moods were similarly upbeat. "We showed ourselves that we could hang with anyone," said Anthony, who also admitted he was having trouble walking after the game. "Considering who we were playing, we improved a great deal. We gave it all we got and when it came right down to it we didn't have enough."

Rarely has a double-figure loss been accepted with such a lack of frustration.




