being paid. Branch said he disagreed with the allegation that ARA's employees were underpaid. He said they were paid wages competitive with other food service employees in the area.

According to the report, "Many of the above grievances might have been prevented had employees enjoyed recourse through an effective grievance procedure."

Branch said ARA employees did have an adequate grievance procedure written in the handbook issued to each employee.

The report, however, states that employees were told by ARA management that the grievance policy in the handbook was invalid.

Also, the report's authors thought the grievance policy as written in the handbook was inadequate and insult-

ing, Hassel said.

He said ARA's grievance policy began insulting employees in its first line: "Despite the sincere efforts of management, employees do sometimes feel they have grievances."

Hassel said, "It implies that any grievance a worker has is just an illusion of the worker."

The report's proposal for a University-mandated grievance policy for food service employees would give workers an independent grievance channel in case they experienced problems with the management itself, he said.

Hassel said the grievance policy was presently written employees did not have an objective hearing if they felt they had been mistreated by the management.


