King said, "Don't worry about what you say, but what you don't say."

Smith said, "Ask a bunch of questions." Others were more to the point, like Harold Hall, now a teacher at Jordan High School in Durham. "Don't let (the government) mortgage your future."

Some were very philosophical with comments like "Don't compromise your principles," and "Be true to yourself," yet several said that it was too hard to generalize.

What are these people doing now? Some are into advertising, psychology, real estate and teaching, while some prefer to change their careers every six months. Famous Harry's people include Russell Banks, author of "Continental Drift" and other novels (he is writing an article on Harry's reunion for "Vanity Fair"); Peter Harkness, executive editor of the "Congressional Quarterly"; Ben Jones, who once worked for Harry's and is known for playing Cooter on the "Dukes of Hazzard," is running for Congress in Georgia; and Mike Putzel, a reporter for Associated Press in Washington, D.C. The list goes on.

Macklin said that seeing all the people from the past had inspired him. He is forming a new Harry's for Chapel Hill.
