Cooper said the problem was the University's bureaucracy. "It's a mistake for Student Government and the president to give in to what the administration says."

Gunter said the problem was a lack of student awareness. "Students are asking 'How can I get involved?'" He proposed putting sign-up sheets in dormitory lobbies, instead of in the Union.

Hill said solutions need to be found for the financial aid cuts. "I can't keep you interested if I can't keep you here," he told the students. He opposed suggestions by other candidates to cut textbook prices, because Student Stores pays for some student scholarships, he said.

"A lack of cohesiveness" was cited by Sitton who said Student Government needs to work together with student groups to achieve larger goals. Several organizations, including Student Government, were working on the prejudice issue, and if they united they could be more effective in dealing with the administration.

Asked what was wrong with the present SBP's administration, Sitton said Bryan Hassel's executive assistants worked on projects while he was left with bureaucratic chores. She said she would have assistants to work on both aspects.

Cooper said the problem was in having too many assistants. Projects should be handled by the Student Congress committees, and assistants should bring students' concerns to the administration, he said.

Hill said a one-year term was not enough so he would work with a chief of staff or co-president.

Gunter said the problem was in getting away from campus issues.

Brady said the problem lies with "an 8-by-11 sheet called the grievance task force," referring to the commit-

tee's poll.

Bailey agreed with Brady.

In the CAA portion, Carol Geer, a sophomore history major from New York City, said she would like to see students have more time in the weight room and regular accessible swimming hours in the new pool near the SAC as well as some extended basketball hours in Woolen Gym.

"... I'm concerned with making students aware of the athletic opportunities we already have here," she said.

"Through publishing a complete UNC sports perspective, which would be distributed to all freshmen during orientation, and through distributing a monthly calendar, hopefully in the DTH, we would reach the students with a lot of essential athletic information."

Suzanne Lowe, a junior speech major from Raleigh, said she wants to make homecoming accessible to the students through corporate involvement.

"In this way the companies would bring in money in order to provide the students with benefit concerts, comedians and a variety of different groups," she said.

"I don't think that The Monkees and the Lakers-Bulls game offered enough to all the different students, and also \$17 per event is kind of crazy to expect students to pay for their own homecoming."

Denny Worley, a junior economics major from Canton, N.C., said groups should get involved in homecoming.

"I would also like the parade to become larger, with more bands, as well as having better prizes and recognition to the float winners," he said.

For RHA, Kelly Clark, a junior journalism major from Asheboro, is running uncontested for RHA president.

One of Clark's main concerns is whether Old East and Old West should remain all-male dormitories. "Most of the people in the area want them to be," he said.
