Field hockey squad sweeps three; volleyball splits in trip to Midwest

BOSTON — The UNC field hockey team won three games this weekend to up its record to 4-0 on the season. Junior Julie Blaisse led the Tar Heels as they blanked Maine 3-0 on Friday, New Hampshire 4-0 on Saturday and Northeastern 1-0 on Sunday.

Blaisse scored her fourth goal of the season on Friday to lead the Tar Heels over the Black Bears. Laurel Hershey and Peggy Anton also added goals, with Leslie Lyness, Hershey and Michelle Russell picking up assists.

The Tar Heels dominated the statistics as well, outshooting Maine 25-4. North Carolina also picked up 16 penalty corners to Maine's two.

The next day Blaisse continued to pop up in the scoring column, assisting on three of the four Tar Heel goals against New Hampshire. Leslie Lyness opened the scoring 5½ minutes into the game on an unassisted tally. Blaisse and Jennifer Anderson then assisted Hershey and Lyness goals to push the score to 3-0.

Kathy Staley closed the scoring book when she converted Blaisse's

third and final assist into a goal. UNC again dominated the second half of the game, amassing 15 shots on goal while New Hampshire managed but four attempts. In addition, UNC took 16 penalty corners to New Hampshire's three.

Blaisse appeared again on Sunday to frustrate Northeastern and give the Tar Heels a three-game weekend sweep. But this game was much closer, as UNC narrowly defeated Northeastern 1-0.

Hershey scored a goal off a Blaisse pass 27:18 into the second half for the only score of the game.

Last weekend was just a tune-up for what may be the Tar Heels' biggest week of the year. They begin a three-game home stand against three national powerhouses when they host Iowa on AstroTurf Field.

After the Hawkeyes, UNC will face Old Dominion on Sept. 24 and close the home stand the next day against Maryland.

Volleyball

Coach Peggy Bradley-Doppes' crew spent the weekend in the Cradle of Coaches, losing on Friday to Miami of Ohio before rallying the

next day to dust the Lady Spartans of Michigan State.

The Tar Heels took a 5-0 record into the Miami of Ohio Tournament, but saw their (half) hopes for a perfect season go down the drain at the hands of the Lady Redskins, 15-7, 5-15, 13-15, 15-12, 16-14.

That loss dropped UNC to the always-dreaded loser's bracket, where the Tar Heels rebounded to defeat MSU, 13-15, 15-13, 15-12, 15-10.

Individual stars for North Carolina included Liz Berg, who posted kill totals of 22 and 27; Andrea Wells, who had 15 digs in the loss to Miami; Sharon German, who made 18 kills on Friday; and Lisa Joffe, who paced the win over the East Lansings with 14 kills, including four solo blocks.

Oh, yeah, and Illinois State beat Miami for the championship.

UNC's record is now 6-1.

rebounding from a first-round loss to defeat Jason Rubell of Duke (6-3, 7-6).

Women's matches were delayed to a greater extent than the men's, but early-round results showed three first-round victories for the women's team.

Ann Stephenson, seeded No. 2 in the women's singles first flight, easily raced past Susan Saunders of N.C. State, 6-0, 6-0. In the second flight, Gigi Neely's 6-1, 6-1 win over Jennifer Ahrendt of Duke and Kelly Sharp's three-set win against Virginia's Becky Kopak (6-2, 6-2, 6-3) accounted for the other two Tar Heel women's first-round victories.

In the top flight, Valerie Farmer, Gina Goblirsch and Spencer Barnes all rebounded from first-round losses to win in the losers' bracket. After losing to top seed Patti O'Reilly of N.C. State (6-0, 6-3), Farmer blew past another Wolfpack player, Delphine Karjala, without losing a single game.

Goblirsch also won rather handily in the losers' bracket after a difficult first set in her match against State's Katie Fleming, 7-5, 6-0. After splitting sets with State's Jenny Sell in a 4-6, 6-3, 6-3 loss, Barnes won her match in the loser's bracket against Kelly Kolankiewicz, 6-1, 6-2.

All four men's doubles teams were sent to the losers' bracket after first-round losses.

from forward Brendan O'Hanlon. O'Hanlon jumped over the sprawled-out Royer for the rebound, but Cogsville appeared out of nowhere to boot it out from in front of the goal. Then at 43:50 Percy juiced his way through the North Carolina defense but fired wide at the net.

Whatever Dorrance said to his players at halftime must have inspired their killer instinct, as the Tar Heels showed an aggressive blood lust early in the second half. Unfortunately for UNC, this very physical style didn't translate into goals.

They had their chances, but the ball kept sailing over the goal or wide to the left on the long shots. The Tar Heels seemed to be hurrying themselves, not taking the time to set up and work their way into scoring position. This wasn't as much their own fault as it was the defense of the Percy-led Indians. By closing off the passing lanes, they forced UNC to take whatever it could get.

What they finally got was a head goal by John Cocking at 73:11. With an assist from Marc Buffin, Cocking ripped it past goalie Larry Hayes to pull North Carolina to within one.

But UNC's hopes of a come-from-behind victory were quickly shattered, when at 77:30 Catawba's Craig Morton took a long pass and duplicated Cocking's head shot.

O'Hanlon then put the game out of reach, shaking Cogsville before faking out Royer and rolling it in for the easy goal.

The result of Sunday's game was even more shocking, considering the way North Carolina played on Friday against USC-Spartanburg. There was almost nothing they didn't do wrong en route to a convincing 6-2 win.

The Rifles got on the board first on Daniel Rebeck's chip shot from 15 yards out. But after 10 minutes of back-and-forth play, UNC took over, pulling even at 27:29 on a blast from freshman Alan Tinkham.

With 10 minutes left in the half, Cogsville put the Tar Heels up for good. The senior took a flick pass from Missimo and went right to left for his fifth goal of the season.

Frustration showed in the way the Rifles' defense began to crumble. Where before they could contain the UNC break, now they left the lanes wide open. Cogsville worked it in to Tinkham, who bounced his shot off USCS goalie Inaki Sanso. Missimo took the rebound and powered it into the top of the net from point-blank range.

The second half was all North Carolina. Missimo scored at 55:26, drawing Sanso out of the goal and rolling the ball into the unprotected net to make it 4-1.

Goals by freshman Chapel Hill native Chip Kepner, who nailed a shot dead center from the top of the box, and Tinkham put the game farther, and further out of reach for the Rifles.
