Dirty Rotten Scoundrels Michael "I'll make any movie" Caine and Steve Martin (last seen in "Roxanne") team up for a comedy based on the 1964 film "Bedtime Story" which paired David Niven and Marion Brando for the first and last time. Caine plays a smooth con-man who smarms money from wealthy women. Martin, a rather less smooth con-man, tries to take over his prosperous line of business, and a contest ensues between them. Frank Oz, director of "Little Shop of Horrors" and the voice of Miss Piggy, directs from a screenplay by Dale Launer ("Ruthless People").

Torch Song Trilogy Harvey Fierstein brings his Tony awardwinning play to the screen. As he did on stage, he plays Arnold Beckoff, a professional drag queen; and Matthew Broderick, who originally played Beckoff's adopted son in the Broadway production. now co-stars as his lover. Anne Bancroft completes the trio as Beckoff's Jewish mother in what promises to be one of the more controversial films of the season.

Another Woman Woody Allen's second drama in a row after the drab "September" stars Gena Rowlands as a college professor who moves in next to a psychologist and becomes involved with one of his clients. This blatant variation on Ingmar Bergman's "Wild Strawberries" has received much critical praise, particularly for its cast that includes Gene Hackman, John Houseman, Sandy Dennis and, of course, Mia Farrow.

Women on the Verge of a Nervous Breakdown This film is already breaking house records in New York theaters. It's the latest from young Spanish director Pedro Almodovar, whose past films. "Law of Desire." "Matador" and "What Have I Done to Deserve This?" have made sex and weirdness more enjoyable than ever before. The plot of this one involves a separating couple, a feminist lawyer, an institutionalized estranged wife and another woman who has recently broken off an affair with a Shiite Muslim and is on the run from the police and they are all on the verge of a nervous breakdown. Frankly, how can you go wrong?
