## Leapin' lizards in Florida

**PLANT CITY, Fla.**—Fifth-grader Mike Lee's pet walks on a leash, jumps through a hoop, plays dead, wears a helmet and rides a scooter.

The pet is a lizard.

It's a simple garden variety, called an anole lizard, that skitters on sidewalks and leaps between blades of grass. It showed up one day at Mike's front door in this farming community 25 miles east of Tampa.

"I almost stepped on him," the youngster said. "Then he ran in the house."

The 11-year-old named his pet Figment, after a Disney World character, and patiently taught the lizard tricks to

show off at school. The lizard taught the shy boy, whose family has moved 14 times, to make friends.

Mike had a feeling his new pet was special when it sat in Mike's hand for long periods. The youngster began working with him.

First, there were hoops. Figment effortlessly jumps through Mike's mother's bracelet with a gentle nudge.

The easiest trick is playing dead. Mike flips the lizard on its back and rubs the reptile's smooth, beige tummy. Claws in the air, eyes closed, Figment almost looks as though he's smiling.

But getting a leash and helmet on the squirming creature took more doing. "Figment," the youth admonished

during a training session. "Keep your hat on!"

Mike slipped a small collar fashioned from a rubber band past the lizard's snout, then carefully placed Figment on a tiny doll scooter. He plopped on the helmet and gently pushed the lizard around.

Lex Salisbury, curator of the Lowry Park Zoo, said he's never heard of anyone training a lizard.

"This must be a special lizard," said Carolyn Lemanski, Mike's math teacher. "I don't think all lizards can do what he does. We've had more lizards caught in the last month. Everybody thinks they can train their lizard."

## Actor Quaid weds limo driver

**LOS ANGELES** — Actor Randy Quaid married Evi Motolanez, a former limousine driver who handles his schedule, it was disclosed Tuesday.

The private evening ceremony took place Thursday at a coastal San Ysidro Ranch near Santa Barbara, said Quaid's publicist Paul Bloch. The groom's brother, actor Dennis Quaid, actress Meg Ryan and Amanda Quaid, the groom's 6-year-old daughter from a previous marriage, attended.

Bloch said the couple, who met two years ago, plan to take a honeymoon sometime next year.

Randy Quaid, who starred in the movie "Vacation" with Chevy Chase and won acclaim for his portrayal of Lyndon B. Johnson in the TV miniseries "LBJ," appears in two upcoming motion pictures, Bloch said.

He stars again with Chase in the holiday release "Christmas Vacation" and next summer he will be seen with Bill Murray in "Quick Change."

Country crooner wins award

**NASHVILLE, Tenn.** — Smooth singing George Strait, voted country music's best entertainer, could hardly believe he had won the award after five years in contention.

"Slap me! Pinch me!" he told a throng of well-wishers Monday night after being presented the honor at the Grand Ole Opry House during the nationally televised Country Music Association (CMA) awards program.

The soft spoken Strait, said the accolade capped his career.

"I've worked really hard for eight years. It finally paid off."

"The fans couldn't be denied. They have been so great to me. I owe this to them."

His album, "Beyond the Blue Neon," is No. 8 on the Billboard country music chart this week. It has already gone gold, selling more than 500,000 copies. Strait's July hit record, "What's Going On in Your World," was his 19th No. 1 song.

Despite his steady success this decade, the CMA's top award had eluded him.

"I was starting to think maybe it wouldn't happen."

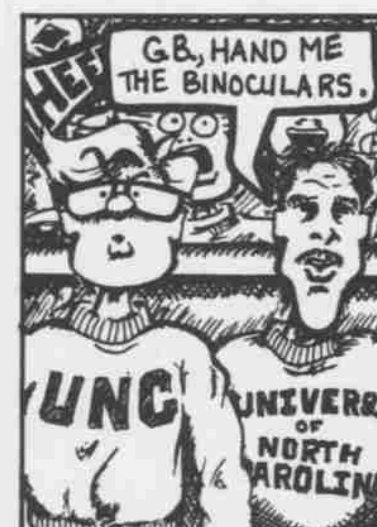
**Sultry actress looks for challenge**

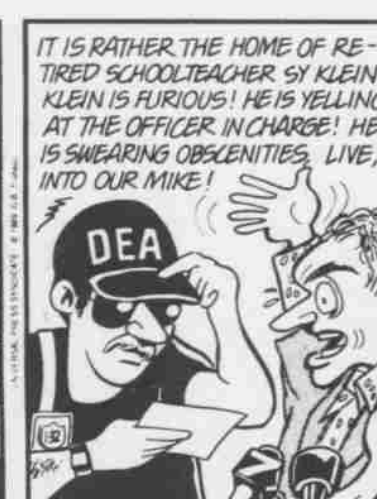

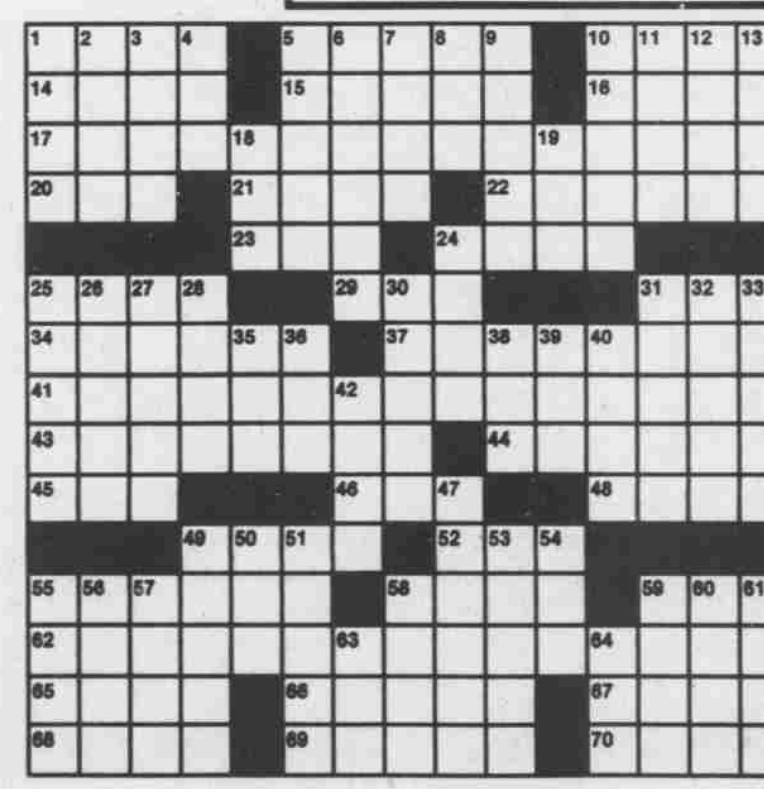
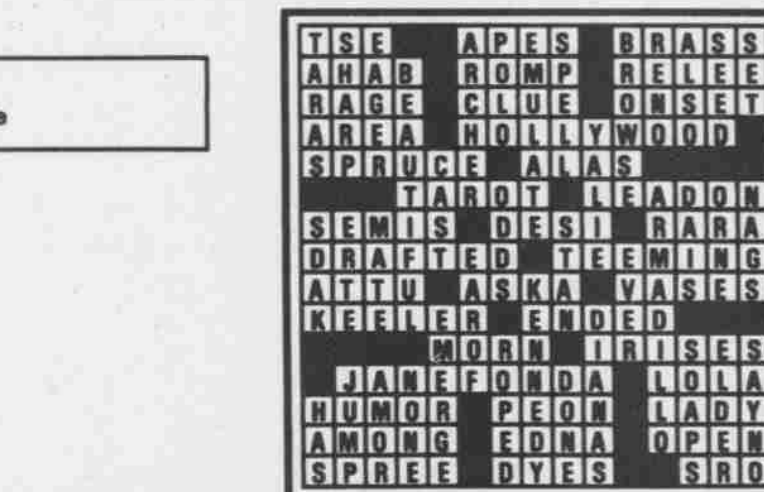
