truck said, "What the hell is going on? We're missing five pledges."
 "I said, 'Two of them just got hauled away by the campus police. The third one's getting ready to go to the emergency room.' The person inside the truck responded, 'Goddamn! How the hell can they get caught?' Then they turned the truck around and left without getting out."
 Senior Eileen Dordek, a Kappa Delta member, also witnessed part of the event. "There were cars outside the sorority and my window was open. I heard some people screaming. 'Get in the house! I heard sirens across the street, and some friends and I went over to the planetarium. While we were standing near the police cars and the ambulance, two guys in a car drove up to us and we went up to them and said, 'One of your pledges fell and hurt himself and two more are in a police car.' The driver of the car said, 'We knew three of them were missing.' Then they drove off without approaching the police cars or ambulance."
 King also said the incident was not a hazing activity of the fraternity. "It was not pledge-related. We did it just for the hell of it."
 Sterling Gilreath, president of the Inter-Fraternity Council, said he knew little about the incident. "I have not

heard anything official about it. Of course, on the whole issue of hazing we go along with the University and state policies against it. The Inter-Fraternity Council works with the University to try to stop hazing."
 The council will probably investigate the matter later, Gilreath said. "I think we will have an executive committee meeting and we will look into it."
 Gilreath said no action was being taken right now concerning the issue. "Right now, we're in no position to penalize anyone. We encourage compliance with our rules, but at this point that's about all we can do. If any penalties come down they will come from

the Inter-Fraternity Council collectively."
 Dean of Students Frederic Schroeder said he was "aware of the event," but he would not comment further.
 Philip Floyd, a member of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, said he saw the entire incident, but because of his work with the Undergraduate Student Attorney General's Office he could not discuss the case. The Student Attorney General's Office received a report of the incident. "Any time a police report is filed, it automatically comes to our office and we automatically investigate it. It's being investigated as any other report would be. So far no charges have been filed."
