# Giant Christmas card making the rounds

**RALEIGH** — A three-story Christmas card that is being taken on a tour of all 50 states before being sent to the Soviet Union was signed by shoppers in Raleigh, where it made its only stop in the Tar Heel state.

"With the opening of the gate over there, a people-to-people gift is a wonderful thing," said Elinor Workman, a teacher from Wilson who was taking a break from shopping to sign the card.

The card from the people of the U.S. to residents of the Soviet Union was displayed last week at Crabtree Valley Mall.

Despite decades of strained relations between the two superpowers, Jim Lawlor, the founder of America's Greeting Card to Russia, hopes to end the '80s on a goodwill note. Raleigh was the 36th stop for the card.

"It's a people-to-people thing," said Lawlor, a businessman who has closed his Fairfield, Iowa company, United Safety Inc., to undertake this project.

His goal is to collect 1 million signatures by Jan. 1, when he and a group of 40 Americans will journey to Moscow's House of Friendship to present the card to Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev. The greeting card now has 300,000 names on it, including Yoko Ono, the members of Fleetwood Mac, Barbara Streisand, Aretha Franklin and the Pointer Sisters.

**Fake bills cost students**

**GATLINBURG, Tenn.** — Using phony dollar bills in a soft drink machine may have seemed like a joke to three high school students, but the state calls it forgery.

The suspects, two 17-year-olds and one 16-year-old, are scheduled to appear on forgery charges before a Sevier County juvenile court judge Jan. 10.

Less than \$10 had been put into the machine at Gatlinburg-Pittman High School when it was discovered, said police chief Harry Montgomery.

It appeared the students initially got faculty members to copy the bills for them by telling the teachers they wanted to use the copies in a Monopoly game, Montgomery said.

The students could also be charged with counterfeiting, but Agent Jess McGaha of the U.S. Secret Service office in Nashville said the service is not pressing charges.

"There were no hardened criminals involved here."

**New look for Christmas**

**SANTA MONICA, Calif.** — Residents of this seaside community can kiss holiday mistletoe goodbye, along with Christmas trees and sleigh bells, because the city has given traditional street decorations the heave ho-ho-ho.

Old St. Nick will ride into town under a wave of ocean-themed vinyl

banners depicting sea gulls, dolphins and kelp.

"The generic candle and Christmas wrapping could go in Des Moines or Cincinnati," said artist Laddie John Dill, who designed the banners with graphic artist John Van Hamersveld.

The Santa Monica Area Chamber of Commerce commissioned the 225 banners, which are being strung up on lampposts. Each 3-foot-by-7-foot banner shows a gull, dolphin or seaweed.

"The kelp gives a mistletoe feeling, the dolphins are in a wreath design and the gull looks like a Christmas dove of peace," said Michael Segal, who headed the design project.

**Bird receives free travel**

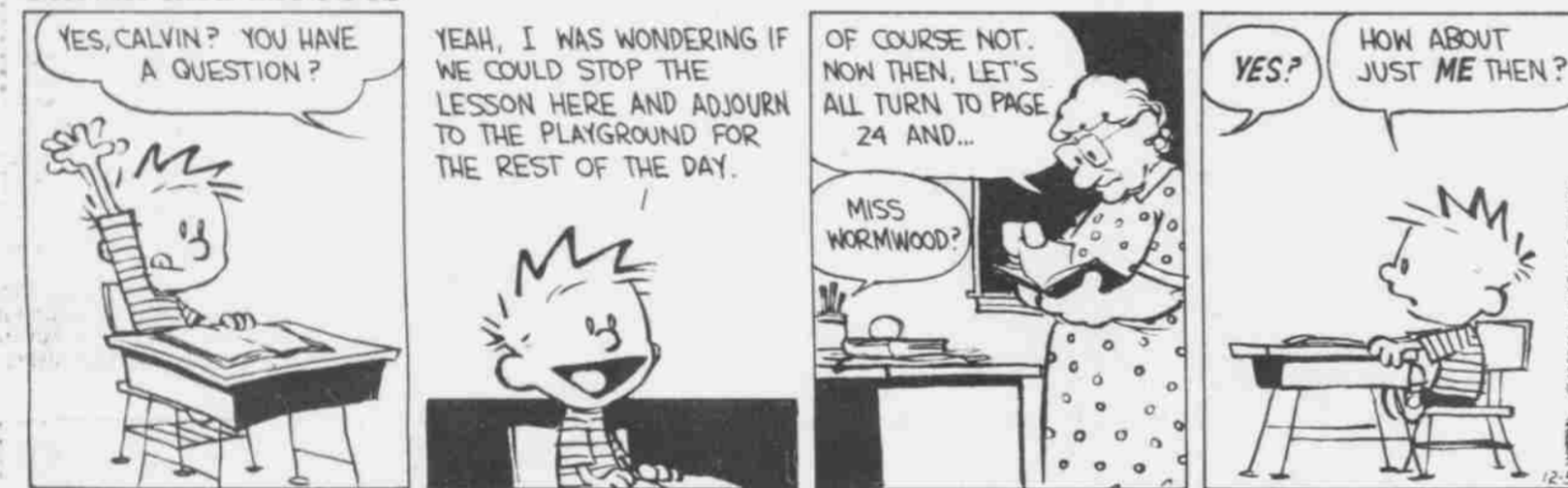
**JUNEAU, Alaska** — A hummingbird that stayed too long in Alaska is about to get a free flight to California with the help of an amateur ornithologist who took the bird under her wing.

Hummingbirds usually leave the Alaska Panhandle by late summer, but a male Anna's hummingbird appeared in October outside the home of a woman who had put her hummingbird feeder away for the winter.

The woman put the feeder back outside and contacted Bev Woods, a volunteer with a Juneau wildlife group.

Woods provided a trap to catch the bird, and is feeding it at her home until transportation can be arranged.
